Only about three policemen were in the vicinity of the meeting. When darkness came, the throng dispersed and the delegations marched back to their respective headquarters, with their hands playing Irish airs.

An appeal from Cardinal Manning for subscriptions to alleviate distress in Ireland was read in all the Catholic churches of the metropolis yesterday. It states that in the west of Ireland such hunger, poverty and want are now to be seen as had never been known since the great Irish famine. A general collection for this purpose is appointed for Sunday next.

The Times, in its financial article, says: Among other evidences of the reviving capacity of Europe to counteract the reverse trade of balance with the United States, are advices from Germany which show one million hundred weight of steel blocks have been sold for shipment to America by Krupp and others.

Twenty-seven persons were dancing on the ground floor of a factory in course of construction at Foggai, Naples, when the two upper floors fell upon them. Seven persons have been extricated, but there is no hope of rescuing the others alive.

The military court before which the Nihilists charged with attempting to assassinate General Dentreven were on trial, has sentenced Mersky to be hanged. Tarkhoff has been condemned to hard labor in the Siberian mines for 13 years for assisting to conceal Mersky. Six others have been acquitted.

The Czar left for Lividi on his return to St. Petersburg.

Count Zichy's resignation is the first sign of Baron Haymerle having decided upon great changes in the Austrian diplomacy.

The fullest conviction prevails here that Austria will support all English efforts at Constantinople as far as possible.

Under instructions from the Viceroy of India, ex-Ameer Yakob Khan left Cabul to-day for Peshawur under charge of Captain Turner and escort. He will reach his destination in eight marches.

Baker Pasha has started for his post as representative of the Sultan to superintend the introduction of reforms throughout the whole of Asia Minor.

LONDON, 2.—A split in the Turkish cabinet threatens to produce a ministerial crisis, owing to differences between the prime minister and minister of the interior. The result will probably be the resignation of the latter.

The Post, commenting upon Yakob Khan's departure from Cabul for Peshawur, says: This news is of great significance. It probably means that Afghanistan has seen the last of its Ameer. It also points to the restraint, if not actual punishment, being in store for Yakob for his carelessness, if not connivance of the massacre of the embassy. The exact part he played may never be known. A commission of inquiry are reported to have found it absolutely impossible to obtain evidence that would justify conviction for the major offence, but there is more than enough to establish Yakob's weakness and culpable negligence.

Paris papers announce that at yesterday's cabinet council it was resolved to immediately demand a vote of confidence from the Chamber of Deputies.

A Berlin dispatch says: The Czar will inform the nobility of Moscow at a reception to-day of his determination to call a number of unofficial advisers to assist him in the government of the empire. The council will be purely deliberative, without any right of control or interference, and will be chosen partly by the suffrages of the middle and peasant classes, and partly by direct nomination by the Czar from the ranks of the hereditary nobility. Other measures of local reform will also be announced. These innovations have been strongly advocated by the Czarowitch.

The Formation of Character.

In last summer's roots nature finds

the germ for next summer's verdure. If somebody should give me a diamond to carry to Europe, I can know exactly how much would be lost to the world were I to drop it into the sea: but if a seed should be given me, I can only regard it with awe, as containing, concealed within it, the food of untold generations. That is the difference between looking at truth as a diamond or as a seed—as final or germinal.

"In all training of character, continuity and economy must be supreme. The notion that character is spontaneous is held by most people in the earlier portion of their lives, and is wrong. When they discover this, nine-tenths change to the other extreme. This is a wrong, too. Hosts of young men think that character will form of itself and that they will necessarily become better as they grow older. Hosts of old men believe that their character is fixed and that it is impossible for them to become better. Such beliefs are foolish. People are also wrong in thinking that they can put off their bad traits and put on good traits. The old failures cannot be thus transformed, but out of the old habits new ones can be formed. That is what many a poor creature needs to know. We must make what we are to be out of what we are already."
