Calcium being now a commercial pro-duct, its possibilities were considered in a British association paper by Arthur E. Pratt. It is a volatile, slivery white metal, about as hard as aluminum, melting at 800 C., having a specific gravity of only 1.52, fairly malleable, and a good conductor of electricity. Its useful applications will probably depend chiefly upon its powerful action as a reducing agent and in the refining of metals. It refines impure metals like copper, giving solid castings, by reduc-ing ovides and sulphides, by eliminating dissolved gases, and by uniting with certain impurities to form less dele-terious compounds; but in excess the calcium itself causes brittleness. In sl-leys, the only promise of calcium seems and its effect in giving increased chem-teal activity. Calclum being now a commercial pro

problem of utilizing the vast ac The problem of utilizing the vast ac-cumulations of dust from the screening of coal has been solved by a French chemist by mixing the fine coal with beetroot pulp and resin, and forming into briquettes. The fuel thus prepared burns freely without crumbling, giving intense heat with practically no smoke. The beetroot pulp is the waste from the manufacture of beet sugar, and hitherto has been practically useless. This invention offers another promising ethod of lengthening out the contin

uance of our fuel supply. The work of orators and singers has been found by Dr. Marage of Parls, to vary greatly with the pitch of the voice. The bass voice is at a great disadvab-tage, and in the same hall it requires 17 to 18 times as much work as the bari-tone or tenor voice to give the same impression. Powerful, deep-voiced men are more fatigued by the same oratoric-al or nusical performance than more Exlicate men with voices of higher pitch, or than women and children.

Two new meteorological instruments, Two new meteorological instruments, the invention of Prof. de Guillen Gar-čla of Barcelona, give promise of use-fulness in countries, like England and France, which are visited by thunder-storms from the ocean or from a direc-tion that can have no weather station to give warning signals. What he to give warning signals. What he calls the ceraunograph takes advantage of the fact that even the feeolest lightning flash generates electric waves.

receiver equipped with a Morse tele-graph recorder registers every flash not grap more than 1.000 kilometers (cf:1 miles) away, and thus shows when a thunder-storm is in progress within that dis-tance. To distinguish between two or more storms coming simultaneously he has designed another apparatus, which has be arread the consumptions. This he has named the certainophone. This seems to be a modification of the loud speaking telephone, and not only en-ables the observer to detect storms at even greater distance, but may show whether they are approaching or reced-ing.
