Washington, April 3.—Great interest was manifested in official and diplo-matic circles tonight over the Associ-ated Press report that the Chinese had determined not to sign the Manchurian agreement. No official information has worked the sourcement of the prinagreement. No official information has reached this government or the prin-dpal foreign embassies. To the Rus-sian ambassador the news came as a great surprise, as he had hoped for a successful conclusion of the convention. Tribune from Washington says:

There are a number of claims of Cuban-Americans which were taken up by the state department and pressed on the Spanish government for reparation for injuries inflicted or for imprisonment. In two or three cases of this kind the Spanish authorities had agreed to make compensation for the injuries. Among these is that of Mrs. Ruiz, the widow of Dr. Ricardo Ruiz, who it was charged, was killed in jail near Havana in the last days of President Cleveland's administration. Mrs. Ruiz filed a claim for \$75,000 damages, and since the death of her husband has been living in Washington in poverty. It is part of the unwritten history of the Spanish-American war that the Spanish government had agreed to pay this claim, when the explosion of the Malne ended all possibility of a peaceful settlement of the Cuban question, Among the claimants for property

losses there are a few Spaniards who may get some compensation because managed to have their plantations they placed in American hands or had formed American partnerships. There are also a few Cuban planters whose estates were so heavily mortgaged that they were glad to let them pass into American ownership. Some subjects of European powers also managed to acquire American citizenship just as a good many Cubans acquired it. One of these classes of naturalized Europeans
