ANOTHER PARDON EXTRAORDINARY.

The following document, emanating from the Executive, was served upon J. D. T. McAllister, Esq., Territorial Marshal, by some of the interested parties, on Wednesday last, which, to say the least of it, extends pardon to transgressors by wholesale. We publish verbatim, as before:

UTAH TERRITORY
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

To all to whom these presents shall come greeting:

Whereas at the March term of the District Court for the Third Judicial District in said Territory A.D. 1863. The Honorable John F. Kinney Presiding. Richard Cook, John Parson, Edward Moss, Daniel Smith, John B. Ledgeway, John O. Mather, James Mather, Richard D. Aloey, Alexander Warrender, William McGhie, Elijah L. Chappel, John E. Jones, John Cook, David Thomas, Peter John Moss, Joseph Taylor, Mathew Mudd, James Bowman, Robert E. Farley, William W. Thomas, Alexander Dow, John Keehorn, John C. Edwards, John Gray, Joseph Dove, Thomas L. Williams, William Davis, Alonzo Brown, Edward Lloyd, Samuel Halse, Elijah Clifford, George Thompson, Goodman Goodman, Soren Peter Gould Jorjen Jensen, Soren Willisen, Lars Christen Hanson, Andres Jensen, Swen Hagg, Soren Peter Rasmussen, Hans Peterson, Peter Peterson, John Peter Sorensen, Niels Larsen, Niels Andersen, Michael Christen Christensen, Gens Paulsen, Niels Peterson, Lars Christen Larsen, Hans Aggersen, John G. Loosely, Lebrecht Barr, John Nielsen, Nels Rasmussen Beck, Christen Jensen, Peter Swenson, Niels Magnus Joreneen, Rasmus Rasmussen, James Peterson, Lars Olsen, Gens Christian Senensen, Hans Peter Smith, Andres Anderson, Andres Christopherson, Hans Hanson, Ole Rosenblade, and Peter Sorensen were convicted of the charge of resisting an officer in the service of process, and sentenced each to pay a fine of one hundred dollars.

Now know ye, that I Stephen S. Harding Governor of the Territory of Utah, divers good causes me thereto moving by virtue of the power and authority in me vested have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant unto the said Richard Cook, etc., etc., (all of the aforementioned,) and to each of them full and perfect pardon for the offence of which they stand convicted, and they are, and each one of them is hereby forever exonerated, discharged and absolved from the fine, costs, and charges imposed upon them, or either of them in pursuance of said conviction.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the Great Seal of the Territory of Utah to be affixed at Great Salt Lake City this 31st day of March A.D. 1863.

THIRD DISTRICT FEDERAL COURT.

[REPORTED BY J. V. LONG.]

Wednesday, April 1st.

Court met pursuant to adjournment. Record of Tuesday read and signed by the Judge.

James Dutton, an alien, appeared in court, and, presenting the proof required by law, was admitted a citizen of the United States.

The Grand Jury came into court presented an indictment against Charles Davey for buying arms of a soldier.

The trial was set for Thursday, April 2.

Court adjourned till Thursday, at 11 a.m.

Thursday, April 2.

Court met as per adjournment.

The record of Wednesday was read and signed by the Judge.

The case of the United States vs. Charles Davey, charged with buying arms of a soldier, was called up.

Messrs. Ferguson and Appleby appeared for the defendant.

The following jury were impanelled and sworn to try the case:

Aaron F. Farr, Hiram B. Clemons, Nathaniel Leavitt, James M. Galaher, Thomas Bullock, Thomas B. Broderick, John L. Blythe, Joseph Busby, Henry McEwan, James A. Thompson, Lucas Hoagland and Millen Atwood.

Carl Illig, John Walsh and James Hupp were sworn and testified on the part of the prosecution. Cross-examined by the counsel for the defense.

The jury retired in charge of Bailiff J. D. Ross.

O. P. Rockwell was sworn in as a bailiff.

Hon. Z. Snow moved the court that Hon. Elias Smith be admitted to practice as an Attorney and Counselor at Law and Solicitor in Chancery in the courts of Utah.

Whereupon the Court remarked that, from his knowledge of Judge Smith as a Judge for many years of Great Salt Lake county, and the faithful and impartial manner in which he had discharged the duties of the bench, the Court would dispense with the formality of an examination and allow him to be admitted upon motion as a deserved compliment.

Whereupon Judge Smith came forward and took the usual oath.

The jury came into the court and rendered the following verdict:

We, the jurors, in the case of the United

States vs. Charles Davey, render a verdict of GUILTY.

Mr. Ferguson gave notice that the defendant would file a motion for arrest of judgment on to-morrow.

Court then adjourned till Friday, at 11 o'clock.

Friday, April 3, 11 a.m.

The counsel for the defense, in the case of the United States vs. Charles Davey, filed a motion to arrest judgment.

The motion was overruled.

Court then sentenced Mr. Davey to twenty days imprisonment in the Penitentiary, and to pay a fine of one hundred dollars (\$100.)

Court adjourned till Saturday, at 11 o'clock.

Saturday, April 4th.

Court met pursuant to adjournment.

Record of Friday read and signed by the Judge.

The Grand Jury came into court and made presentments against Edward Ray, Frank Matthews, William Burton and Alonzo Gabbett, for larceny, and against Thomas C. Armstrong, for purchasing a pistol from a soldier. Mr. Armstrong was arraigned and pleaded "Not Guilty," and his trial was set for Wednesday the 8th inst.

The case of the United States vs. Edward Ray, et al. was set for Thursday.

Court then adjourned till Monday at 12 m.

Monday, April 6th.

Court met as per adjournment. The proceedings of Saturday were read and signed by the Judge.

There being no business ready for the action of the Court, it was adjourned till 12 noon on Tuesday.

Tuesday, April 7th.

Court met according to adjournment.

Charles Crow, an alien, appeared in court and, on the testimony of James D. Ross and J. V. Long, was admitted a citizen of the United States.

Mr. Ferguson stated, that in the case of the United States vs. T. C. Armstrong, the defendant, after consultation with him, desired to ask leave to withdraw his former plea. This was granted, and Mr. Armstrong plead guilty and threw himself upon the mercy of the Court, expressing a wish to make a statement to the Court before receiving sentence. The sentence was deferred till next day. Nathaniel Leavitt, for good and sufficient reasons was discharged from further attendance upon the court as a petit juror.

The court then adjourned till to-day at 11 o'clock.

FORWARD SPRING.—The weather has been unusually warm during the last two weeks, and vegetation has put forth rapidly. The season is nearly one month earlier than it was last year at this time, that is more forward. Apricot and many peach trees in this city are in bloom, and apple trees will be in a few days. The prospects for fruit this season are now most favorable. Fears are entertained, however, that it may be injured by frost, in consequence of the trees putting forth blossom so early.
