SATURDAY'S DISPATCHES.

A Rupture Between Frederick and Bismarck. The Ministry Will Doubtless Resign.

Herr Von Tisza Predicts War Before the Paris Exhibition Opens.

The Sentiment in Favor of Thurman is Rapidly Gaining Ground.

The Nomination of Thurman Will Compel the Republicans to Nominate Sherman.

Cowboys Capture a Town in Colorado. The "White Caps" Lawlessness.

Who Will Nominate Cleveland? Rochester, N. Y., June 5.—Delegates Daniel Lockwood it is said will nominate Cleveland at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Mo., June 2.—Delegates O'Brien says it has been settled that Mayor Chapin of Brooklyn is to make the speech nominating Cleveland. Mr. Chapin is known by many as the "Young Titan of the New York Democracy," and a probable candidate for governor this year in case Governor Hill declines to run again.

AS TO THE PLATFORM.
It is agreed it will reaffirm the tariff plank of 1884 and endorse the President's message, but will probably omit any reference to the Mills bill.

THE CONVENTION HALL.
Having little else to talk about, the delegates here are now complaining of the arrangement of the convention hall. Of the 3500 seats in the two galleries, it is claimed fully 1000 are so situated that their occupants will be unable to see the delegates below.

Chairman Barham and Senator Gorman inspected the hall today, and the advice of an architect suggested to the local committee that the seats in the gallery be put upon an incline so that their occupants might have a view of the hall. It develops that the hall is to be used next week for Senger Band, and that the seats in the galleries will be placed on a level with the floor and be made temporary so they can be taken out and small tables substituted for the convenience of the beer drinkers. There is much dissatisfaction about this.

Arrangements in regard to the press table were overruled this afternoon, the national committee finally realizing that the arrangement of the space and tables as made under the direction of McCandless, treasurer of the committee, and Mr. Dickinson, stenographer of the same body, were entirely unsuitable. There is also some criticism over the exalted position which Mr. Dickinson himself is to occupy in the convention. Under the plan, he will be the central figure, and the chairman will be back of him on a little higher level.

AGAINST THURMAN.
St. Louis, June 2.—The Coast delegates have consented to a proposition originating with Maryland, to enter the caucus to be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock for the purpose of selecting a candidate for the vice presidency. Senator Gorman, of Indiana, has been actively agitating the question since his arrival today. The Coast delegates met this afternoon and agreed to discuss the expediency of a combine. Their second choice is Dickinson, whose name is advanced as the evening of the administration, but no positive expression could be obtained. It has been rumored in the minds of all the delegates hailing from the Pacific slope, Senator Hearst, whose name has been freely canvassed for second, has not authorized the report that he is in the race, and appears to be very anxious for it. Indiana is a party to the combine, and the delegates say they cannot hope for a successful campaign with Thurman on the ticket. Senator Hearst was asked this evening to outline his position, but he courteously declined to commit himself to any candidate, alleging as an excuse that he had been out at the race track since he had come to St. Louis and was not going to be disturbed by his delegates. A report was wired from here yesterday stating that Senator Hearst had telegraphed to the Governor of San Francisco to cease advocating Thurman, and on the strength of this report, the Wisconsin delegates were setting their cap to capture the place on the national ticket.

"You can say for me," replied the Senator in answer to a question, "whether or not he was in the race, that I never sent such a message."

Col. John Arkins of Denver, who is an ardent Black man, took the evening when he heard of the Maryland, Indiana and California combine. He said: "Thurman is an old man, and his age is against him and we cannot take chances of any more vice-presidential candidates on our hands. For argument's sake let us say some great calamity occurred by which President Cleveland would be removed. Judge Thurman can't live much longer and the country would find itself at the mercy of an appointee, and a man would be foisted upon the American public who would be a comparative nonentity of ideas, not commensurate with the requirements of such an exalted position as the chief magistrate of a great country like this."

THE WISCONSIN DELEGATION.
Chicago, June 2.—Colonel Knight and Colonel Bird, delegates-at-large from Wisconsin to the St. Louis Convention, "it is in the city," they think we have made up our minds regarding the vice-presidency," said Knight.

"It looks as though Thurman was the man. If he be the candidate, I suppose Wisconsin is for him; the only question is his age. If it is a candidate, I would look to California first, where we need strength."

"How about ex-Governor Stone?"

"He would not do; he is physically too feeble now."

"Do you think you can carry Wisconsin?"

"No; the Democrats are in the minority; it is the labor vote that holds the balance of power. There is some talk of a fusion between the Democrats and the Labor party. On a fusion, the Republicans would be defeated."

Opposition to Bismarck.
Berlin, June 2.—No sooner had Emperor Frederick seemed assured of some prolongation of life, than the influence hostile to Prince Bismarck displayed renewed activity. The conflict between the liberal tendencies of the Emperor and the Chancellor's policy, which had been latent at the outset of the reign, now threatens to end in open rupture. The Emperor is swayed by the opinion of the Empress, who has resumed the active duties secured during the illness of the Emperor at San Remo. Prince Bismarck returned from the Emperor's interview found the Emperor desirous of reconstructing the ministry and also opposed to giving consent to the antiquated Land bill under the advice of Dr. Friedberg. The Emperor signed the bill, at the same time advising Bismarck that he hoped this concession would be followed by reform in the ministry. When Bismarck left the Emperor on Thursday, the crisis appeared to have been settled. Today a transverse rumor had been consulting his colleagues on the order of the Emperor for a postponement of the publication of the law. It was reported the Emperor had cancelled his signature. The report, however, is unconfirmed. The ministerial crisis fears the worst. The progressive rejoice at the prospect of the advent of a liberal regime. The crisis has not yet reached the climax of the resignation of the ministry, and until Prince Bismarck has again consulted the Emperor, the issue of the conflict is doubtful, but the

situation is grave enough to cause profound uneasiness.

The Emperor's adjustment of the Unterhaus, Herr Von Tisza is reported to have stated that

A EUROPEAN WAR
Involving the fate of France would intervene before the Paris exhibition was opened.

Owing probably to the anxiety combined with yesterday's fatigue, the Emperor is worse today; his fever appeared, the discharge of pus became copious and the general discharge has been greater. The doctors forbade his going into the park this evening seeing he was greatly fatigued.

The passport regulations on the frontier are already becoming relaxed. Today's Strasburg Gazette announces that passengers by the eastern express having through tickets from Paris to the interior of Germany will be released from the obligation to produce their passports, providing they do not leave the train within Alsace-Lorraine.

The Paris embassy reports that 750 passports were received Thursday and yesterday. The extension of the regulations proves that the government's sole object is to keep out of Alsace-Lorraine that class of travelers who come to the frontier for the reason of the province to France.

M. Goblet's speech in reply to Premier Von Tisza's statement has been badly received in Berlin and the Vienna foreign office is distrustful of Hungary, and his allusions to the German frontier measures decided the Austrian Hungarian ministers to curtail their peaceful policy towards France.

CANCELLED HIS SIGNATURE.
The Emperor after signing the quinquennial bill prolonging the term of the Prussian Parliament, has withdrawn his signature, and the ministers at his sitting today resolved to resign unless the bill was signed and published.

Audacious Cowboys.
STEWART, Col., June 2.—A gang of cowboys took possession of the town this morning and about demolished the post office and its contents. About 100 shots were fired, but no one was hurt.

Presbyterian Doings.
PITTSBURG, June 2.—At today's session of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of the United States resolutions were adopted restraining from identification with the nation so long as it refuses to acknowledge Christ as its King and enjoining the churches under the care of the Synod to see that members of the congregations do not identify themselves with the nation by any act that applied to allegiance and refusing ecclesiastical fellowship with other churches which allow their members to identify themselves with the nation in its neutrally claims of Christ as King of the nation; also denouncing secret societies, endorsing prohibition and characterizing tobacco as filthy and injurious.

The Synod adjourned until Monday.
