BANK OFFICERS ELECTED.

Joseph Nelson Denies That He Was Thrown Out of Jordan Institution.

A meeting of the recently elected directors of the Jordan State Bank was held in the bank office on Saturday afternoon for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. Besides the directors in the south end of the county, the following were present: Ashby Snow, Charles S. Burton, O. C. Beebe and H. T. McEwan from Salt Lake, who went down in an automobile in company with Joseph Nelson.

After the meeting Ashby Snow stated that the business transacted was the election of a new president and vice president, consisting of William Aylott and Henry T. McEwan. Mr. Snow said that while William Aylott did not want the position particularly it was thought best to have a man in the position of president who lives in the Jordan Institution. J. W. W. Fitzgerald, the former president, resides in the south end of the county.

A committee was also appointed to audit the company's books and report to the directors later the results of their labors. The committee is composed of Messrs. Beebe, McEwan and Fitzgerald.

With regard to the story published about his being thrown out of the bank on Saturday afternoon, Joseph Nelson said today that the report of what had occurred was greatly exaggerated. He was refused admittance by the cashier, but there was nothing in the nature of a row, nor was he thrown out as reported.
