

WICKERSHAM MAKES ATTACK ON GAYNOR

Atty-General Says His Course
As Judge Has Been Marked
By Chicanery.

HE TIES WHACK AT HEARST

Mayor's Office Should Not Be Entrusted
to Owner of Newspapers Dis-
tinguished for Unethical License.

New York, Oct. 29.—With United States Atty-General Wickersham bitterly attacking William J. Gaynor in behalf of the Republican fusion ticket, attacking the fire and investment were made nearly all over Greater New York tonight, with the municipal election only two working days away. Hundreds of minor mass meetings were held, while the respective heads of the two tickets—Independent, Democratic and Republican—were the chief speakers at larger gatherings.

William R. Hearst spoke three times on the East Side; William J. Gaynor spoke in Brooklyn and then came to Manhattan, while Otto T. Barnard, representing the theater district, except downtown, then up into Harlem. The candidates confined themselves rather to attacking their campaign arguments.

Hearst keeping up his appeal to the common people, struck a popular chord by announcing that if he were elected mayor he would hire a policeman's hall, where he would appear at stated times for a reckoning at the heads of the people and answer their questions and to receive their advice. He said he was prepared to meet reporters at the coming election.

Gaynor, who has been called a "big game" man, said, "and we expect to send a regular Hudson-Fulton parade to the same place during the coming month. But we are going to let the tiger this year—kill him and skin him and nail his hide to the wigwag."

Mr. Barnard spoke principally of the police and personal liberty, a subject which he said, should be respectfully removed from politics and the enjoyment of the law should be reasonable, but not reasonable.

WICKERSHAM ATTACKS GAYNOR
Atty-General Wickersham, speaking in New York City, attacked a bit of personal favor to the campaign. "I am not here as a federal official or a member of the president's cabinet," he said, "but as a citizen and a taxpayer of New York. In this capacity I feel it my privilege and duty to aid in this effort to put competent and honest men at the head of the affairs of the city."

Preoccupied with the intense competition of their business, men are apt to leave city government to professional office-seekers.

Gaynor, who is confronted with conditions, as in the present campaign, is the average New Yorker stirred from his slumber in private business to his public affairs. Anomalous revelations of management of city affairs will surely upon every citizen to redress the city from its present reproach. Every consideration demands a concerted effort to defeat the Tammany party.

The mayor of New York is indeed one of the most potent executives of the world. To what kind of a man this would a citizen of New York, concerned only with the selection of an honest, an effective administrator of his vast estate, naturally turn? Surely not to a judge whose course upon the bench has been characterized by political chicanery and demagogic appeals to popular favor; surely not to the proprietor of a chain of newspapers distinguished for their unbridled license and their gross abuse of the liberty of the press.

So he naturally would turn, as has been the case with the fusion ticket, to a man of wide, successful business experience. Such a man they found in Otto T. Barnard.

Judge Gaynor, in his address, took the defensive and leaned on his record. He stated that he had never been tried for violation of the revenue laws, as has been charged by his detractors.

As to the charge that he had a monthly income of \$10,000 from taxes, he said, "the truth was, he said, that he owned property assessed at \$5,000 and mortgaged for \$14,000, yielding him \$10,000 on his investment."

Robert P. Moore, Democratic candidate for the controller, brought suit today for \$100,000 for libel against William R. Hearst, because of an article published this morning in the American, charging that Moore had been used as a "dummy" to obtain large loans for Charles W. Morse.

NO PARTY TO BLAME FOR WHITE SLAVERY

New York, Oct. 29.—Jeremiah W. Jenks, professor of political economy and politics at Cornell university, gave out a statement here today declaring "white slavery" does not exist in New York, as charged by an anti-Tammy magazine article, but he does not hold any political organization responsible. Prof. Jenks, who was a member of the commission appointed by Congress to investigate immigration conditions, said:

"I have no knowledge as to whether the traffic is greater in New York than in Paris. I believe, however, that it is greater in New York than elsewhere in the United States, because New York is the largest city; second, because it is the chief port of entry. Women imported for immoral purposes for Chicago and Seattle largely come through New York, and many of the dealers are here. There is no question that the traffic exists on a large scale in New York, and that foreign New York many women are sent to other states, and even some to foreign countries."

WAR BETWEEN SALVADOR AND ZELAYA GOVERNMENT

St. Louis, Oct. 29.—A cablegram from the Globe-Democrat from Panama, says:

Passengers arrived today from Pacific coast points north of here report that war has broken out between Salvador and the Zelaya government of Nicaragua. President Figueroa of Salvador, has issued an order mobilizing the Salvadoran army for the purpose of repelling the invasion of Nicaragua and Salvadoran exiles under the command of General Alfaro, and with the view of adding the Nicaraguan revolutionists in their fight against Zelaya.

Salvadoran gunboats have been ordered to patrol the coast of Nicaragua. The Guatemalan government is making warlike preparations and President Cabrera is expected to join forces with Salvador and the Nicaraguan insurgents and assist them in crushing the power of Zelaya.

McMAHON PLEADS GUILTY TO TRIPLE MURDER

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 29.—James McMahon pleaded guilty in court at Kansas City, Kan., late today to the murder of his two sisters, Rose McMahon and Mrs. Alois Van Royen, and his brother-in-law, Alonzo Van Royen. He was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Kansas penitentiary at Lansing. A deputy sheriff left for the penitentiary with the prisoner tonight.

Both McMahon and his family were eager to have the case settled immediately, and they sought a concession of the authorities to enter the plea without the formality of a jury trial. Prosecutor James Taggart asked McMahon questions about his age and occupation, and the case was disposed of in less than 10 minutes.

"I am glad to get started on my term," said McMahon as he started for prison. "They tell me Lansing is a pretty fair place to be in."

WOODROW WILSON SEES CHANCE FOR DEMOCRATS

Plainfield, N. J., Oct. 29.—Dr. Woodrow Wilson, president of Princeton university, addressed the Plainfield Democratic club tonight on "The Democratic Opportunity."

He found his message in the situation presented by the passage of the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill in the face of strong Republican opposition.

"The Democratic party," he said, "is now facing an unusual opportunity and a very great duty. It is free to choose policies suited to the national conditions as a whole, and is free to make a program for the general good if it will. But it should do this without allowing itself to be embarrassed by old formulas."

"The debates of our coming campaign must center on the means we are to use in accomplishing ends it is necessary to accomplish."

"The principle upon which the Aldrich tariff bill is based is not the benefit of the country at large, but the benefit of those engaged in the industrial, the incompetent along with the competent."

"The demonstration of the whole thing, its corrupting effect upon our politics, its enfeebling effect upon our industries, its sinister effect upon our political principles, is now evident to every man who allows himself to think without self-interest."

"Apply our principle to the trust question and it will yield."

DR. JORDAN GOING EAST.

Stanford University, Cal., Oct. 29.—David Starr Jordan, president of Stanford university, will go east Nov. 12 to attend the meeting of the Carnegie Foundation Institute of Science, which is now acting president since the resignation of Dr. Eliot. Later Dr. Jordan will attend a conference in Washington on the international fisheries question. President Taft, Secretary Knox and Commissioner Prince, representing Great Britain, will be present.

TESTS TO DETECT FLOUR BLEACHING

Chicago, Oct. 29.—Dr. A. L. Winton, chief inspector in charge of the local government laboratory, surprised the flour men of Chicago last night by explaining in detail the various tests to which the government subjected their goods to detect bleaching and adulteration. To speak before the Flour Men's club of Chicago, at the Great Northern hotel, and by a number of strophian views, convinced the dealers that it was well-nigh impossible to practice deception under the regulations of the new pure food law.

He gave the flour men this advice: "Don't emphasize too freely that a product is a brain food; too many of you have swollen heads already."

"Don't insist on your products being 'pure foods,' most Americans have nerve enough."

"Don't insist the much that they enrich the blood; all cereals do this, and I hope, enrich the manufacturer."
