

BRANSFORD TURNS DOWN DEMOCRATS

He Refuses the Nomination of Mayor on Their Ticket This Morning.

"AMERICAN" ONLY, HE SAYS.

Mont Ferry and Party Will Wait on Him Tomorrow With Formal Tender to Place Him.

Major John S. Bransford refused the nomination as mayor on the Democratic party ticket this morning when he was met by a committee of Democrats at his office. The delegation was composed of ex-Mayor Richard E. Morris, John Dern and A. N. McKay. After pleading his past affiliations with the party, the delegation urged him to accept the nomination. In reply Major Bransford said:

"I cannot consistently accept the nomination on the Democratic ticket, although I have been affiliated with the local organization until three years ago. If I accept any nomination at all, it will be on the 'American' city ticket."

"I am not sure that I could be nominated on the 'American' ticket, but if such were the case I would be grateful for any endorsement that might be given me."

Major Bransford stated further that he had been elected as an "American" and that he had tried to carry out his best principles in behalf of the party. The delegation of Democrats withdrew after receiving his reply and will probably recommend that the party endorse Bransford.

"American" party business men will meet Mayor Bransford tomorrow afternoon to convey to him a formal offer to place him at the head of the ticket. A meeting of representative business men, who have voted the "American" ticket, met yesterday in Col. E. A. Wall's office and decided to start a petition among the business men to endorse Mr. Bransford. The petition was started this morning with Col. Wall's name at the head of the list. The petition will be handed tomorrow to Mayor Bransford when the delegation calls on him and it is understood that they will not take no for an answer.

Today there is a move afoot circulating a petition among the business men to place Mr. Bransford at the head of the Citizens ticket.

Joseph Lippman is still at work lining up his forces and is working hard for the "American" nomination. Henry G. McMillin has practically withdrawn from the race in favor of Bransford.

In the last few days Lippman has started a card index system and is securing pledges. The card system which has established rivals the famous system of Frank H. Hitchcock, who managed the campaign for President Taft. Many of the opposition have denounced it as un-American.

A meeting of business men will be held this afternoon in Col. Wall's office and a Bransford club will be organized, it is said. The membership will include those who favor his election.

The Democrats met last evening in the office of James H. Doyle and decided to put a ticket on the field. The following ticket was practically endorsed.

For attorney, J. R. Stringfellow.

For auditor—William Battam.

For recorder—A. N. McKay.

For treasurer—Joseph E. Canne.

The head of the ticket has not been decided upon. The Democrats were anxious to nominate Bransford but it is probable now that they will endorse him.

CITIZENS' TICKET.

The members of the Citizens' committee declare that they have not made a formal offer to anyone. Two of the committee called on Mayor Bransford
