

FIRST TAX NOTICES.

County Treasurer A. D. Chambers ex-ects tomorrow to have the greater part of the first tax notices ready for mailing, about 10,000 in all. During the past week, he has had a large corps of assistants busy copying the notices from the tax rolls. In all there are about 30,000 descriptions on the notices. He has been working three shifts, one coming on at 8 o'clock in the morning, who work until 5 o'clock p. m., when another shift comes on and work until midnight, and then the third shift comes on and works until 8 in the morning. The valuation in Ogden City and Weber county this year will be about half a million dollars. Besides a arge increase in assessment valuations this county has also made the assessment of the Union Depot company's property, the street railway and other arge corporations under the recent uling of the supreme court. The exact figures of the assessments are not yet ready to be given out, but will be a great increase over last year.
