

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—On Saturday evening there was a crowded house to witness the performance of "Hamlet." The piece was played in splendid style, and seemed to give intense satisfaction. Mr. Warner, as Hamlet, was immense, his performance being characterized by such excellence, that we never expect to see it surpassed. INTERNAL REVENUE CASE.—The point determined in this case, and upon which the Court definitely charged the jury, is one so peculiarly a feature of the internal revenue laws, and so adverse to the *modus operandi* of all other business transactions, that, for the information of all persons liable to the special tax under which the law is made, we insert the clause in question. It will be no disparagement to any person, whether a manufacturer or other operative, to be advised upon a provision of law so generally applicable as this, the existence of which was not known even to the Court, the district attorney, or the counsel for Mr. Snelgrove, prior to the instance now referred to. It reads thus:

"And every person exercising or carrying on any trade, business or profession, or doing any act for which a special tax is imposed, shall, on demand of any officer of internal revenue, produce and exhibit the receipt for payment of the tax, and unless he shall do so may be taken and deemed not to have paid such tax."

The obvious intent of the above clause is to provide the Assessor an extraordinary and summary remedy in cases of delinquency, or of attempted evasion of the special tax law. It could not have been intended, however, to place power in the hands of any assessor or his assistants, to arbitrarily annoy or impose upon any individual having paid his tax, or having a willingness to do so, when a legal demand is made therefor. Unwarrantable assumption on the part of officials clothed with a "little brief authority" has been odiously felt in this community in the past. No marvel then that the whole community should feel very interested in this case of Mr. Snelgrove.
