#### won. Joseph Stanford's Position on The Liquor Traffic in Ogden Canyon-Divorce Suit.

Hon. Joseph Stanford, chairman of the board of county commissioners, being desirous that the public should know that he opposes the granting of a license for the selling of liquor in Ogden canyon, furnished the "News" with the following copy of his report and motion on the matter.

"I find the number of petitioners, who request that no license be granted for the sale of spirituous and vinous liquors in Ogden canyon, aggregate 450. Of this number 180 are from Ogden valley. I am also personally informed by leading citizens of the settlements in said valley that the people are almost unanimous in opposing the granting of such license for the reason that life and property have been in the past placed in great jeopjardy through the presence of the liquor traffic in said canyon. The same reason is also given

canyon. The same reason is also given as a leading cause by most of the citi-zens in Ogden city, who ask that such license be not issued. "Out of a sense of public duty, for the preservation of life and proper-ty, and for the safety of public travel in this canyon, frequented as it is so largely as a health resort and a place of next quict and placesure aspace. of rest, quiet and pleasure, especially during the excessive heat of the sum-mer months, and considering the road is very narrow and the banks precipitous, requiring great care in driving, I move you that no license be granted for the sale of spirituous liquors in Ogden canyon and that the application for license now on file with the board be

The motion did not receive a second from any member of the board and was lost, the other members of the board voting for the granting of a licence to Potter Brothers for the selling of liquors in Ogden canyon.

## **MEETS DEATH ON THE RAIL**

Unknown Man Falls From Train Near Mapleton And is Killed.
