On Jauuary 7th last the crew of the lumber-laden schoouer Maggie M. Rivers, which had become water-logged, deserted their vessel near Cape Hatteras. Since that time the hull of the "spectre schooner" has been drifting with the winds, a constant menace to ocean travel.
