

MURDER OF EMIGRANTS IN THE HUMBOLDT COUNTRY.

A few weeks since, the bodies of twelve human beings are reported to have been discovered in a canyon near the South Humboldt, about eight miles from Gravelly Ford, by a company of emigrants who were passing westward on that route. The corpses were badly mutilated, and had been thrown into a deep hole in a stream of cold water which prevented their decay, although it was supposed they had been lying there for over a week.

The following is a description of the bodies as published in the *Silver Age*: "One boy, supposed to be about 12 years of age, with dark hair, having two large cuts in the back part of the head; a lady, with dark hair, rather small in size, supposed to be about 25 years (perhaps not so old) of age, with several frightful gashes on the head and face, and a small plain silver ring on the third finger of the left hand; one boy, about five years of age, with auburn hair, a severe cut in the back part of the head and on the cheek; one man, with dark hair, twenty-five years of age, cut through the back part of the head and stabbed in the back, had an old scar on one leg below the knee, indicative of having been broken; another, 35 years of age, throat cut, bullet hole in back, dark hair, had on a blue jeans vest, checked shirt and new white woolen socks; a woman, supposed to be 35 or 40 years of age, stabbed in the left breast, hair black and braided, dark calico gown; a little boy, about 4 years of age, with light hair, large cut in head; a boy, about 14 years of age, sandy hair, cut in head; one infant girl, about 7 months old, stabbed in back part of neck; also one girl, about ten years of age, sandy complexion, cut in back part of the head; a girl, about 4 or 5 years of age, cut in the head."

The bodies were taken from the creek and buried in one common grave, by those who found them. A book was found near by, in which was written "George W. Smith."

The murders were supposed to have been committed by Indians, but it seems to have been believed by some that white men had something to do in the matter.

Subsequent reports had reached Carson stating that other bodies had been found, not far distant from where the twelve were discovered, and active measures had been taken by the citizens of Humboldt to raise a company of volunteers to pursue and punish the murderers, whoever they might be or wherever found. Gov. Nye was moving in the matter, and application was immediately made to the officer in command at Fort Churchill, but there were no troops at that post which could be sent out to hunt up the Indians or white men who had committed the bloody deeds. Col. Connor, at Ruby, was then apprised of the state of affairs by telegraph, who announced in reply, that a company of cavalry would be dispatched on the 16th ult., to ascertain the facts, and if possible to find and chastise those who committed the murders.

The *Enterprise*, in referring to the murders and depredations committed by the Indians on the northern routes in the vicinity of Fort Hall, says: "It is quite time that something was done to teach the savages a severe lesson," and suggests that as winter is the best season to operate against them, the matter should be attended to promptly; and as "Col. Connor's boys have been spoiling for action," that it "would be a wise plan to let them vent a little of their pent up fighting spirit" upon the savages, who, if let alone and not punished for their atrocities, will soon become so emboldened in their acts, that there will not be much safety beyond the limits of the larger settlements.

UNITED STATES INTERNAL REVENUE TAX.

THE undersigned would give notice to the public that he has been appointed, by the President of the United States, Assessor of Taxes, under the Act of Congress, approved July 1, 1862, entitled an Act to Provide Internal Revenue to Support the Government and to pay Interest on the Public Debt, for the Collection District, comprising the Territory of Utah.

Agreeable to my instructions from the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, I shall aim to appoint, for Assistant Assessors, persons of business capacity, of well-established character for integrity, and of gentlemanly bearing, that the law may not, in the manner of its administration, be rendered odious to the people.
I have arranged the District into Divisions, and shall immediately complete the appointments for the Assessment of Taxes, and to proceed to assess the Tax as contemplated by the law.

I shall cause to be published, from time to time, such portions of the Law as will immediately interest the people, that they may be prepared to act understandingly.

The Collection District of the Territory of Utah has been arranged, divided and numbered, and the following appointments have been made, namely:

Division No. 1 will comprise Great Salt Lake County. Jos. M. Simmons, Assistant Assessor. Residence—G. S. L. City, 13th Ward, two doors east of the Theatre.

Division No. 2 will comprise Davis county. Arthur Stayner, assistant assessor. Residence—Farmington.

Division No. 3 will comprise Weber county. Walter Thompson, assistant assessor. Residence—Ogden city.

Division No. 4 will comprise Box Elder county. Jonathan C. Wright, assistant assessor. Residence—Brigham city.

Division No. 5 will comprise Cache county. James H. Martineau, assistant assessor. Residence—Logan city.

Division No. 6 will comprise Morgan county. A. S. Davis, assistant assessor. Residence—Morganville.

Division No. 7 will comprise Summit and Green River counties. W. H. Smith, assistant assessor. Residence—Chaik Creek.

Division No. 8 will comprise Wasatch county. Geo. W. Bean, assistant assessor. Residence—Heber city.

Division No. 9 will comprise Tooele and Shampip counties. Evan M. Green, assistant assessor. Residence—Grantsville.

Division No. 10 will comprise Utah county. James W. Cummings, assistant assessor. Residence—Provo city.

Division No. 11 will comprise Juab county. Samuel Pitchforth, assistant assessor. Residence—Salt creek.

Division No. 12 will comprise Sanpete county. David Candland, assistant assessor. Residence—Mount Pleasant.

Division No. 13 will comprise Millard county. John Kelly, assistant assessor. Residence—Fillmore.

Division No. 14 will comprise Beaver county. N. Catlow, assistant assessor. Residence—Beaver.

Division No. 15 will comprise Iron county. Richard Benson, assistant assessor. Residence—Parowan.
