UNITED STATES INTERNAL REVENUE TAX.

THE undersigned would give notice to the public that he has been app inted, by the President of the United States, Astersor of Taxes, under the Act of Congress, approved July 1, 1862, entitled an Act to Provide Internal Revenue to Support the Government and to pay Interest on the Public Debt, for the Collection District, comprising the ferritory of Utab.
