MALACHI'S COVE.

Now the nature of her injury was as follows: The place in which she collected her seaweed was a little cove—the people had come to call it Malachi's Cove—which was so formed, that the margin of the sea therein could only be reached by the passage from the top down to Trenglos's hut. The breadth of the cove when the sea was out might perhaps be 200 yards, and on each side the rocks ran out in such a way that, both from north and south, the domain of Trenglos was guarded from intruders. And this locality had been well chosen for its intended purpose. There was a rush of the sea into the cove which carried there large drifting masses of seaweed, leaving them among the rocks when the tide was out.
