Reduces Wind Friction. The cignr-shaped train invented by A. C. Adams of the Baltimore & Ohio is receiving notice from railway author-taics. The trial trip has been greatly cellpsed by a recent performance, and it is now believed that is will do all that is claimed for it by its inventor. On May 26, a 58-ton engine drawing six cars that constitute the Adams it cars that constitute the Adams train, made the 40-miles' run from Baltimore to Washington, on the Baltimore & Ohio railway, in 37 minutes and 30 seconds. This time covers the start from a standstill, the slow speed demanded by the laws and ordinances of both cities in entering or leaving and the minute or more consumed in com-ing to a full stop, as well as the slackening at the Relay viaduct. The run is said to excel all speed records on the Baltimore & Ohio between the two cities. Several miles were made at the rate of 41 seconds and 8.1 miles were made in exactly six minutes.
