

DIRTY BOOTS.—A curious termination of an intended marriage took place at Halifax recently. Henry Graves, of Mount Tabor, and Mary Mitchell, of Gilbert street, in that town, had arranged to be married at the parish church. The wedding party met before the ceremony at the Spotted Bow Inn, in Gilbert street, and proceeded thence towards the church. The disappointed bridegroom refused to pay anything unless he had the ring, which cost him ten shillings, returned, and then declined to contribute more than one-half.
