Work Started at Tintic Mine.

Ed Hunter, manager of the boots eastern Hercules mine in Cassia county, Idaho, where it has twelve claims ac-quired last April by the payment of \$40,000, says a Spokane dispatch, has announced that a 50-ton smelter will be installed to be ready to receive ore early next May. The carbonate cre resembles that of the Hercules in the resembles that of the Hercules in the Coent d'Alenes. Average assayes in the smelting vein are 22 per cent lead, ten ounces in sil-ver and from three to five ounces in gold.
