WYNDHAM'S POLICY CRITICISED.

London, March 13 .-- During the detate on the civil service estimates in the house of commons today John Redmond, the Irish leader, moved a re-duction of the salary of the chief secetary for Ireland (George Wyndham). and proceeded to incisively criticise Mr Wyndham's policy, asserting that the tter was engineering a conspiracy to misrepresent the condition of the country, in order to give a colorable excuse for coercion. Mr. Redmond said coer-tion would not kill boycotting, but it would exasperate the Irish people at home and consolidate them abroad. He incerely hoped, however, that the tish would not be betrayed into the commission of crime

Mr. Wyndham, in replying, said that plready a great many filegal acts had been perpetrated in Ireland. He wished t to be understood that, both person ally and officially, he was responsible whatever repressive steps were taken by the government. He admit-ted the constitutional right of the people to assemble and proclaim their rievances, but where crime was about committed an assembly became unlawful, and it was the duty of the government to prevent it. Mr. Redmond's motion was rejected

by a vote of 215 to 115.

Washington March 13 .- Charles E. Hagner, for many years a well-known physician in this city and a member of ne of the oldest families in this section, was today held for the action of the grand jury, as the result of 'n inquest over the body of a prematurely-born baby of Mrs. Peter Blair, found yeserday alive and doubled up in a shoe box thrown into a garbage can in the tear of the Blair house. At the inquest today a colored woman

pointed to Dr. Hagner as the man shom she saw place the box in the can. The latter, admitting he was the man, said he fully believed the child was dead at the time

The physicians at the hospital where the child was carried after being found, testified that the baby was alive when received and the negro woman testified that the child was crying when she found it. The

coroner's jury in its verdict held "The child, which was born alive and lived several hours, died from hemthage of the brain, which might have been caused during the premature and that Dr. Hagner, who attended at the birth, was guilty of inexcusable neglect."

For nearly three days he had been without water and he stated when he was able to talk that had it not rained Wednesday he would certainly have died of thirst. CHARGES AGAINST CLAYTON.

Minister to Mexico Said to Have Misstated Facts in Mealy Case.

Washintgon, March 13 .- Mr. Theall, local counsel for Mr. Mealy, the Amer-ican citizen who is held under an order of court in Mexico for contempt, has submitted to the state department, through United States Senator Nelson, a 'ong statement of the case from Mealy's side, which reflects upon United States Minister Powell Clayton. It is alleged that the minister has nisrepresented the facts in the case to the state department, and that he is nterested in a rival mining company, which has affected his attitude toward Mealy and his legal fight with development company, which forms the basis of the present action against

In sending the papers to the state department, Senator Nelson wrote a long letter and referred to the accom panying papers, among which is an af-fidavit in Spanish by Juan Barrera, with an English translation, showing the alleged connection of Ambassador Clayton with certain mining companies n Mexico, in which the Mexican government officials also are interested. Senator Nelson refers to what he calls the serious import of the charges and suggests the impropriety of a minister from this country being a mema large mining company, which is looking for favors from the Mexican government. He says such a minister will not be in a condition to protect an American citizen against the en-croachments of a company in which man; of the leading officials of the Mexican government are interested. He says there is a rule as to consuls which does not allow them to engage in trade in countries to which they are sent, and says that the necessity for such a rule should be much stronger in preventing a diplomatic officer from engaging in speculative mining enter prises. The senator suggests that the questions involved in the Mealy case are important, especially as they affect the status of the minister to Mexico.
