Mapleton, Utah Co., March 13 .-- In an interview with a "News" correspondent Mr. Joseph Tucket said that the prospect for fruit and general farm produce was never better for Mapleton. Mr. Tuckett owns and operates a fourteenacre fruit farm, besides his grain and lucern lands, on a choice spot on the Mapleton bench. Continuing he said: On the 15th of March, last year, we started to water our lucern, while this year the ground is saturated with wat-

er to a great depth. My large wells have six and a half feet of water in them, where last season at this date they only had two feet. I have three large wells, the largest ten feet square, the other two, eight feet square each. I use three wind mills and kept my fourteen acres of small and large fruit in thrifty condition, all through the most trying season which we have yet experienced.

spent about four hundred dollars in machinery and developing my wells last year, which are now about thirty-three feet deep. The hose I use for convey-ing the water from the wells to the tree rows, is home made. I use heavy duck cloth, making the hose five inches in diameter, stitched on our ordinary sewing machine, after which I soak it in boiled linseed oil, and dry it in the sun. I use the ordinary fire hose coupling, and my home made hose is cheap and a decided success for carrying the water to my garden truck, strawber-ries and trees. When the wind fails, I operate a Hayes' three cylinder pump with a one-horse power, costing about one hundred and ten dollars, which throws a stream large enough to irri-gate two rows and would exhaust the water in my largest well in four hours last season

A fruit farmer from Provo bench A truit farmer from Provo bench visited me last week, and after inspect-ing my machinery and wells, departed well pleased at my success, and deter-mined in his own mind to stay by his home and farm, and there and then gave up all notion of selling out and migrating to Orecon nigrating to Oregon. Without the new ideas and methods

now in vogue for saving and increasing the water supply, there is no need of recently improved and which have been more entitled to a surplus water right. Of course it will leaving the lands which have been more led to a surplus water right, course it will take labor money, but this expenditure pay, with an intelligent proper cultivation of the soil. will Again, the scarcity of water as experi-enced for two or three seasons past may not occur again for many years, but the scarcity of the water has taught us to economize; that we must not al-ways expect nature to be propilious. The drouth has emphasized the need of reservoirs, and the digging of wells for water. The past three seasons of scarcity of water is a blessing in dis-guise, for it has taught us many points in regard to the economical use of wat-er, and how to coax it out of mother earth. I got a little anxious last year over a patch of small fruit and paid my over a patch of small fruit and paid my neighbor \$2.50 an hour for the use of his water. In regard to coaxing the water out of the depths, a Mr. Mal-strom up here discovered a damp spot with a bunch of willows close in, right under the foot hills above his farm. He followed in with a tunnel and found a small stream. He has continued tunnel-ing, and today he is in about two hun dred feet; has a well timbered tunnel, track laid for his truck to carry out the dirt above his water channel, which now carries enough water to irrighte now carries enough water to irrigate forty acres. Another gentleman named Schaffer is working on another such prospect and will no doubt be success-ful.

All this grand farming land, which All this grand farming land, which now produces such large crops of la-cern, fruit and beets, was not used until 1860, when a Mr. Sanford led out with what was known as the Union Farm, but the attempt was soon abandoned. My land, now so well set with fruit, repulsed four or five attempts at its reclamation. The toil and labor ex-pended by the people here in those ear.
