SHREWD GEORGIE.

The recent cruptions of Mount Vesuvius have caused people to ask themselves if the famous city of Pompell is to be destroyed again. The loss would indeed be incalculable, for since 1861 archæologists have been uncovering the long buried city and have laid bare at least half its streets. They have also done excellent work in restoring many of the stores and dwellings to their pristine appearance. The accompanying illustration shows one of the most interesting of the restorations, that of the house of the Vettil, with its wonderful pillars and beautifully laid out garden. In the background, but indistinguishable in the picture, are some ancient paintings, the value of which cannot be estimated. There is therefore a worldwide hope that the Silent City will be spared a repetition of the disaster which overwhelmed it centuries ago.
