EASTERN.
Postmaster Appointed.
WASHINGTON, 18.—Robt. Y. Frazer
has been appointed postmaster at
Gunnison, Sanpete County,
Utah.
New Chief Justice for Utah.
The President will, on Monday,
nominate ex-congressman J. M.
Cochran, of Cal., to be Chief Jus-
tice of the Supreme Court of Utah,
the nomination of Alex. White be-
ing withdrawn. All the republi-
cans of the Pacific Coast delegation
in Congress have recommended
Cochran's appointment, especially
on account of his familiarity with
the laws relative to mining and
land questions, which constitute
the bulk of litigation west of the
Rocky Mountains.

The Spencer Inv. litigation.
The Senate committee on privi-
leges and elections, this afternoon,
continued its investigation of the
charges concerning Senator Spen-
cer's election, by the Alabama leg-
islature. Robert Barber, a clerk
of the House of Delegates of the
Alabama legislature, testified that
the latter proposed to have him
appointed marshal when General
Harris's term should expire, and
promised him a long term of office
beginning to labor for Spencer's
