Battery C. Mustered into Service and Awaiting Orders.

## A COMPLETE LIST OF THE MEMBERS

By reason of rapid work in the efforts to recruit the men of the 1st Battalion, C. this organization was mustered into the service of the United States at 1200 o'clock yesterday afternoon.
