#### L. T. TUTTLE,

Democrat, is a resident of Manti, where he is and for a long time past has been engaged in merchandising. He is the only native of Gotham in the group, where he was born in 1825. He was a member of the "Mormon" Battalion and is a Utah pioneer, though not one of the first company, having reached here in 1847. His plurality over Anderson (Rep.) and Johnson (Liberal) was 229.

#### L. M. OLSON,

Democrat, of Price, Emery county, is a Swede and 41 years of age. He has held some minor offices in his community and is a man of ability and education. He defeated Hon. Abram Hatch (Rep.) and Kimball (Liberal) by 128.

#### W. H. SEEGMILLER,

Democrat, is the new Speaker of the House and has previously served in both houses and held a number of other political offices and is president of Sevier Stake. He is a Canadian by birth and is 49 years of age. He defeated Clarke (Rep.) and Phillips (Liberal), having 125 plurality.

#### CHARLES ADAMS,

Democrat, is a native of the "old sod" and is about the same age as Mr. Seegmiller. He settled at Parowan in 1849 and lives there now. He has held a large number of offices but is a farmer by occupation. He had a plurality over Farnsworth (Rep.) and Williams (Liberal) of 480.

#### N. P. SARGENT,

Democrat, represents the Seventeenth district and is a Southerner, 46 years old. He has resided in Utah since 1867 and is a carpenter and builder by occupation, but has decided legal ability. He "downed" Elder (Rep.) and Cniderster (Liberal) by 220 votes.

### THE VISITING EDITORS.

The committee appointed to receive and entertain and escort the members of the International League of Press Clubs during their sojourn in this city left the Rio Grande Western at 9:50 this a. m. The sound made was distinctly heard at the extreme east end of the structure. The carriages were once more entered, and driven east on First street for some distance. They then turned on to Brigham and back to the Knutsford.
