### FAMOUS HORSE DEAD.

#### Pacer Who Has Splendid Record Died From Heart Disease.

From Heart Disease. New York, July 25.-A special to the Times from Pittsburg, Pa., says: "Dan R. the famous pacer, who had a record of 2.23, dropped dead of heart disease at the Brunot Island track here yesterday. The horse was brought to this city last Friday by Edward Benyon of Cleveland, with the understanding that if the pacer could come near equaling this former record he would be purchased by a prominent Pittsburg man. A short time ago Mr. Benyon refused 10.000 for him. Yesterday the horse did not appear to be in good condition, but made the last quar-ter in 29%. He was driven by Dave G. McDonald, general manager of the Brunot Island track. Just as he finished the mustre the horse stumbled and fell. One of the most remarkable railfoads ever constructed connects the Alpine villages of Lauterbrunnen and Murren. Murren is 5,285 feet above sea level on the opposite side of the valley that is crowned by the Jungfrau. The track has a striking resemblance to a ladder, so sharp is the angle of the gradient. The mountain is very rugged, abounding in small ravines over which viaducts have been built. The railroad is operated by cable, the power house being at the summit. The cars start from the opposite ends of the road simultaneously. Each car is equipped with a powerful automatic brake which is sufficient to hold it at any point of the route.
