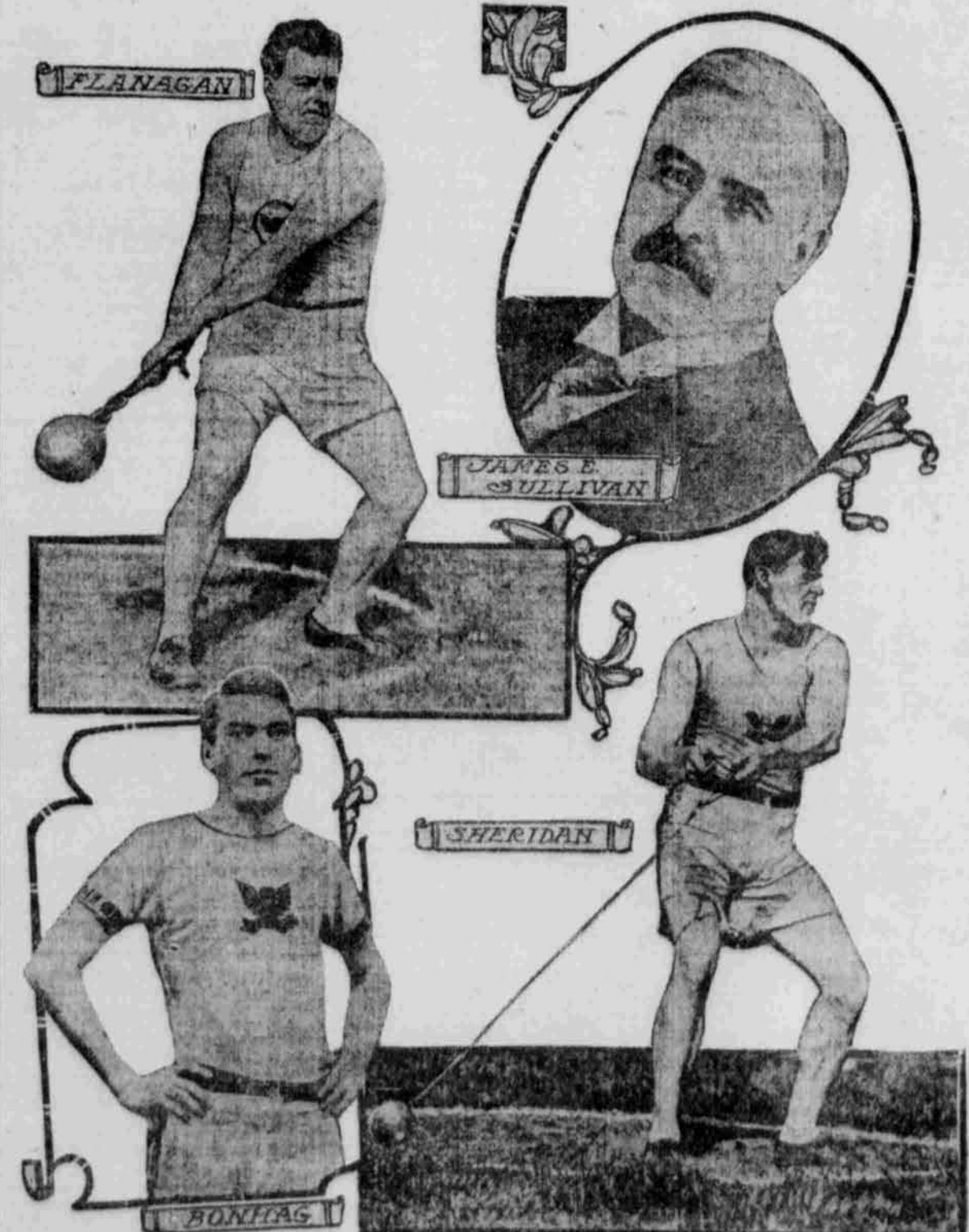
GOOD ROADS ARE MOST IMPORTANT

Series of Comparative Tests of Building Materials Are to Be Conducted Soon.

(Special Correspondence.)

Cleveland, Sept. 24.—One of the noteworthy features of last week's National Good Roads convention in Cleveland was the universal acceptance of the fact that the problem thrust upon road makers by the increasing use of the automobile must be met in the most practical and scientific manner. The committee on road building materials, which was organized at the convention, has decided to conduct a series of comparative tests of building materials. A road consisting of a number of different materials will be built, the road to be utilized for the purpose being a continuation of the state road at East Union, New York. It will be constructed in sections of different kinds. Nearly a dozen manufacturers of bituminous macadam have decided to co-operate with the university authorities in this work. The road will be inspected by engineers well versed in road building and the result of the tests will be published without delay. A new route from Elizabeth to Rahway has been suggested to A. A.
