Grand Opportunity for Dry Farming -Death of Mrs. Lloyd.

St. John, Tooele Co., Feb. 15 .- This little town is located nine miles southwest from the mining town of Stockton. and about twelve miles northwest from the West Dip mining camps, and about sixteen miles northwest from Mercur. and is near the Johnson Pass, where the Deep Creek wagon road crosses the Deep Creek wagon road crosses the mountains to Skull valley. This was once a great grass and stock country, but has been entirely eaten out of grass by the numerous bands of cattle, horses and sheep that have been kept here for many years past. At the present time the people are giving more attention to their farms, which are small on ac-count of our water being limited. Through the scarcity of grass on the range and the limited supply of water the people are beginning to look around m for other facilities to take hold of, and a few have begun the experiment on dry farming, which is being done on a small scale as yet. No doubt in the

a small scale as yet. No doubt in the near future there will be much grain raised here by this method as we have thousands of acres of good land in Rush valley, and can obtain plenty of water for culinary purposes by digging wells from twenty to fifty feet. It is believed that there is sufficient water in nearly every locality in this valley by digging every locality in this valuey by digging one hundred feet and putting in the most improved pumping plants to raise the water for irrigating gardens, or-chards, shade trees and so forth, and that with the most improved methods of dry farming many hundreds of fam-

ilies will in the near future make them. selves comfortable homes within fifty

miles of Salt Lake City.

The people of St. Johns have a great obstacle to overcome in the mineral that crops out in the land lying below the irrigated fields, and destroys every-thing it comes in contact with. The low, undrained ground below the town is now a mineral swamp. But if this was drained perfectly the mineral could be eradicated and this land restored to usefulness. It is feared by some that when the water is applied to the higher the mineral will increase 071 land the low lands. But with a larger quantity of purer water such as the new reservoir system will produce, it is believed that the mineral can be washed out. To this end suitable open drains will probably be constructed, and then St. Johns will come to the front, as the high lands will produce better frult and be freer from late and early frosts and produce better alfalfa if not grain. The last week a larger force has worked on the dam than ever before, and it is pleasing to see this renewed energy and it is hoped that a united effort will continue until this needed undertaking completed and the community begin to realize a return for their efforts.
