LOCAL BRIEFS.

Card Party This Evening.—The Women's auxiliary of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers will give a card party this evening, at 299 east Third South street.

Charity Ball.—A committee will be at the Salt Lake theater tomorrow morning to receive provisions for the charity ball supper, and donors are asked to bring their supplies as early as possible.

Do You Want a Job?—There will be civil service examinations in this city, Dec. 5, for the positions of chief clerk in the government hospital for the insane at Washington, with salary at \$1,500 and maintenance, also for the position of preparator of fossils, with a geological survey, at \$75 per month.

Battery Inspection.—Col. Land of the First Infantry acting brigadier of the line, will inspect the light battery, Friday evening next, and Troop A on the evening of the 14th inst. There have been a number of accidents of late as to what has become of the new adjutant general who appears to have dropped from mortal coil.

Shortage of Coal.—Local coal dealers claim that the experiences of last winter in regard to coal supplies are pretty sure to be repeated, as many citizens have not profited by the shortages that then occurred, and have neglected to lay in a stock ahead for the coming cold weather. Dealers are still accepting orders subject to 10 days' delay. However, the Utah fuel people report a steadily increasing output of coal from their southern mines, and a decrease in the shortage of cars. This will help the city situation.

Choirmaster Assaulted.—Karl Scheid, the choirmaster of St. Mark's cathedral, was the victim of an assault last evening, by Land and Water Commissioner Matthews and was badly cut on the lips. Matthews had been drowning his political sorrows in ecstasies at the Second South street chemical factories, and taking umbrage at something Mr. Scheid said, shielded a left hander at him, damaging the vocalist's exterior organ of song to the extent indicated. The chorister called on Police Sgt. Hempel to arrest Matthews; but that astute officer only observed that he had not seen the assault, and therefore the only thing to do was to swear out a warrant, which Mr. Scheid said he would do this very day.

STOLE VALUABLE WATCH.

Ivan Hicks, Elevator Boy, Under Arrest for Theft.

Ivan Hicks, who until recently was an elevator boy at the Cullen hotel, is under arrest on a charge of having robbed A. Van Patten, an Ogden mining man, of a valuable gold watch and chain. Hicks implicated a young man named Paul Falkner, and the latter has been arrested at his home in Pueblo, Colo., and will be brought here for trial. Police Officer Carlson leaves for the Colorado city today for the purpose of bringing Falkner back.

Mr. Van Patten lost his timepiece on Oct. 29, and for a time it looked as though the owner would not recover it. Some time later the boy Hicks was arrested by Officer Carlson, while the former was carrying a suspicious looking bundle. The parcel contained a watch which had been stolen from the Cullen, and following up a clue Carlson soon connected the purloining of the dry goods with the theft of the watch. Hicks took Falkner into his company after the robbery, and the two hid the watch, but subsequently Falkner removed it from the hiding place and departed with it to Colorado.

SLUGGED BY FOOTPADS.

Albert Moore Knocked Unconscious And Robbed of \$18.

After lying for an hour unconscious from a blow dealt by footpads, Albert Moore was found by Stephen Alley, who lives at 841 Eighth East, about 7:30 o'clock last evening. He was cared for by the above named police headquarters could be notified, when he was removed to the emergency hospital at the city jail, where he remained during the night.

Moore is about 23 years of age and is a recent arrival in the city. In quest of work, he visited the Barker-Karpis gang in Parley's canyon, yesterday afternoon, and was returning back to Twelfth South and Eleventh East with two young men in a buggy. Thence he started to walk to town, and at a point a little south of Eighth East and Eleventh South, he was hailed, he says, by two men, one of whom struck him on the head and knocked him senseless.

It is thought that the young man was then dragged into vacant lot, where he was robbed of about \$18.

Moore regained consciousness soon after he was discovered, and his wounds are not of a very serious character. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the deed.
