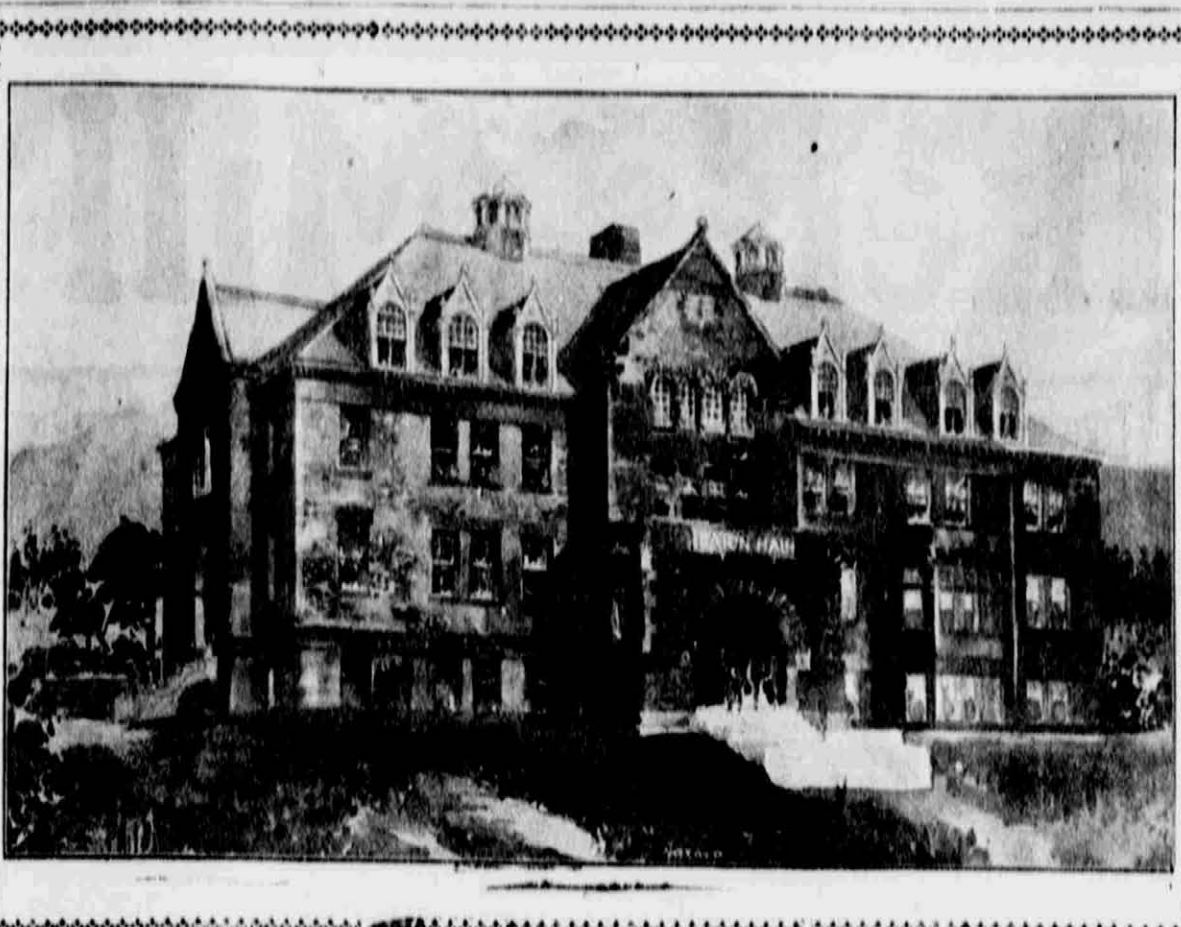

NEW WESTMINSTER COLLEGE BUILDING.

Above is a view of the first building of Westminster college which it is proposed to erect shortly at the corner of Thirteenth East and Eleventh South streets, where the college corporation owns 20 acres. The structure will be 45,000 feet in areal dimension, with high basement of stone, and two stories of pressed brick above that, surmounted by a spacious attic devoted to dormitory purposes. The basement will be utilized for heating plant, refectory, canteen and storage purposes. The first floor will contain administration offices, recitation and lecture rooms, and reception apartments. The second story, like the attic will be given up to dormitories. The architects are Ware & Tripp, and the cost of the building is figured at about \$40,000. Not much has been said about Westminster college, but the work of

gathering the money for the main college building is going steadily forward. When the new main college building is completed, it is the intention of the trustees to let contracts as soon as the details of the work have been completed. The Collegiate Institute, near Second South on Second East street, is the preparatory department of the college, and college work has been carried on in the old institute building to the south of the latter institution structure. There will be freshmen, sophomore and junior classes during the coming year. The institute completed its thirtieth year last April, but the coming year is probably the last that the work of the institute will be carried on at the present location, as the property, the building, will be sold this fall, and the proceeds used for putting up two handsome buildings on the college grounds. When the new main college building is completed, a woman's college building will be constructed on the south-western side of the college grounds. In view of the desirable improvements in the near future, and the beautification of that section of the town, especially with a fine campus, many residents living in the vicinity regret very much that two or three objects are making an effort to have streets opened through this prospective campus, thus diluting it and, as the college people say, interfering with important improvements.

SMART SUMMER WOOLTEX COSTUME.

For the cool days of summer, and for the vicissitudes of travel, these smart wooltex costumes fill many a niche in the wardrobe. The one illustrated displays that type of loose coat that the Parisians term a "caraco," and which is immensely modish at the moment. The material is a gray striped flannel, just such as is used for men's suits, and a dainty touch is achieved in the use of a custom gray suede for the cuffs, and the same tint in velvet for piping and buttons. The coat is loose throughout, but not baggy at any point. A clever effect is in the plastron front, in which the stripes are arranged on the cross, and the velvet buttons with ivory rim, used for simulated fastenings. The sleeve is slit at the cuff to display the suede, and the turnover corners here and on the patch pockets are faced with white cloth with charming result. The skirt has that smart Parisian bias seam down the center front, the fullness laid in a broad double box pleat tablier, the same idea repeated in the back, this disposing cleverly of the extra fullness of the circular cut. The drop skirt has an interlining of princess haircloth for some nine or ten inches above the hem; this to support the full flare and ensure the correct hang of the dress skirt.

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
