HIGHER OCEAN FREIGHT RATES.

New York, Oct. 31.—Ocean freight rates to Europe are from 10 to 20 per cent higher, and they are likely to go still higher before they reach their former level, but there is no fear of a scarcity of room in spite of the increased exports to which the shippers are looking forward this fall.

INDIA'S SACRED FIRES.

BANK OF ENGLAND RAISES RATE OF DISCOUNT

London, Oct. 31.—The rate of discount of the Bank of England was raised today from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 per cent. The increase had been regarded as a foregone conclusion having inroads made upon the Bank of England's stock of gold by the demand from America and the recent rise in the discount rate of the Imperial Bank of Germany. Since last Thursday the United States secured about \$2,500,000 in gold from the Bank of England and in the open market, and the bank's reserve has been reduced slightly below £21,000,000, which, however, was £2,000,000 higher than at this time last year, when the bank rate was 6 per cent. It was hoped early in the month that the Bank of England might finish the year without increasing the rate but the financial flurry in America upset their calculations and caused a decided increase here, necessitating protective measures. Apart from the American demands, the Egyptian requirements for the movement of the huge cotton crop of that country have yet to be satisfied and money wanted in Brazil and Germany. Should London require assistance it seems to be agreed that the bank should raise the rate of discount to 6 per cent.

JAPANESE IMMIGRATION.

Four Big Companies Are Operating in Vancouver. Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 31.—The hidden factors in the Japanese immigration were disclosed today by a witness named Ishikawa, before Government Commissioner King, who is settling riot damages. The witness declared that four Japanese immigration companies operated in Vancouver. These companies are now prepared to bring large numbers of men from Japan and have made large contracts with railway companies to transport them.

"BLACK BOOK" CONSPIRACY.

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 31.—Atty. Louis K. Hull today appeared before Judge Loehner of the United States court, and in behalf of the 99 lumbermen indicted for the so-called "black book" conspiracy, withdrew separately the plea of not guilty entered Oct. 10, by each and filed a joint demurrer on the part of all. The demurrer states that the facts charged do not constitute an offense against the law of the United States.
