WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the North Pacific and Central Gulf states, and lowest over the middle Rocky Mountain slopes.

The rapid development of the cyclonic and anti-cyclonic conditions over the central Rocky Mountain slope and the North Pacific states respectively, caused very high winds and gales over Utah last night and with general rains over the northern tier of states and also over the British northwest territories.

The largest amount of rainfall were at Miles City, Montana; Bismarck, North Dakota; and Moorhead, Minnesota. The total amount of rainfall at Galveston, Texas, for the last 48 hours was 2.30 inches.

The temperature fell from 12 to 22 degrees over portions of Utah and Idaho.

Last Sad Rites Over the Remains of a Noble Woman and Good Mother.

DAILY'S PAVING PLAN.

The plan provides for the building of a retaining wall in the center of the street six feet high, the paving on each side of the wall to be reduced to 36 feet in width and the sidewalk and parking on the sides of the street to be increased to 30 feet in width.

The grade of the north side of the street will be lowered two feet and the grade on the south side raised two feet.

By changing the grade of the street, lowering the height of the retaining wall and decreasing the width of the sidewalk, it is estimated that a great reduction in the cost of the work will be made.

The plan of Mr. Kelley and Mr. Daly is that the retaining wall be reduced from nine to six feet in height. The residents along the street have agreed that the parking will be well cared for and it is stated that a park association will probably be formed for that purpose. After the committee adopted the plan of Mr. Daly, the matter was referred to City Engineer Kelley for an estimate of the cost of the work, which was submitted to the council as soon as possible.
