FORTY-FIFTH CONGRESS,

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 3, 1879.

From the joint committee appointed

to inquire into the expediency of

transferring the Indian Bureau

from the Interior to the War Depart-

ment, submitted a report signed by

four members of the committee

in favor of the transfer. Offered

and read.

From the committee on

privileges and elections, presented

the minority report in favor of a

10th Amendment to the Constitu-

tion prohibiting states from dis-

franchising persons on account of

sex. Ordered printed. The report

is signed by Hoar, Cameron, (Wis-

consin) and Tilden.

Edmunds called up the Senate

bill to provide for ascertaining and

settling private land claims in New

Mexico and Colorado. The object is to

settle the titles to lands derived from

the Spanish and Mexican govern-

ments. The bill was discussed and

passed.

Consideration was then resumed

of the resolutions of Edmunds de-

claring the validity of the 15th,

14th and 15th Amendments to the

Constitution, and Morgan con-

tinued his argument in favor of the

substitute presented by him.

Coke submitted amendments to

the Senate bill providing for the

construction of a railroad from

Galveston, Texas, to a point on the

Canadian Pacific, at Chicago, Minn.

Mexico. Ordered printed and re-

ferred.

Bayard then took the floor, but

yielded to Ransom for a motion for

adjournment.

Burnside introduced a bill mak-

ing an appropriation of \$10,000 for

military roads in Idaho. Referred.

The Senate adjourned to the next

session, and when the doors

were reopened adjourned until

Monday.
