The following were drawn and challenged and excused: William Shaw, W. H. Yeaman, B. W. Morgan, F. D. Clift, J. M. Allen, and L. W. Rivers, for bias in the matter, which might prevent them from rendering an impartial verdict. Edwin Dix was excused because his name on the jury list appears as Edward Dix. John Addams was excused because he had within two years served on a jury. The prosecution challenged peremptorily Aaron Farr, T. C. Griggs and William Salmon, who

had passed for cause, and they were excused. The defense similarly challenged R. Osborn and M. K. Henderson, who had also passed for cause, and they were excused. The vacancies having been filled, the complete jury as given above were instructed to allow nobody to talk to them about the case, nor to talk about it themselves, after which the case was postponed until Thursday, to await the arrival of District Attorney Van Zile from the East. If he returns sooner the trial will take place sooner. But on Thursday it is fixed to commence even if he is not in attendance.

Court adjourned till this morning at 10 o'clock.

Proceedings to-day:

The jury empanelled to try the case of the People vs. R. T. Burton were excused until Thursday morning. The other members of the petit jury were excused for one week.

We are informed that the wells on the higher parts of the city are drying up. Will not the gentleman, whose business it is to look to such matters, see if something cannot be done for the people who are complaining? We will then confer a favor upon them and be thankfully remembered.

City Council.—Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, Feb. 11th, 1879, Mayor Little presiding:

A petition was received from H. B. Clawson and five other wagon and implement dealers, asking permission to place samples of wagons and implements upon platforms across the water ditches in front of their places of business. Petition received and prayer thereof not granted.

Morris & Evans, asking permission to use for a period of 60 days, half the sidewalk and a portion of the street on which to pile building materials in the construction of a new building on East Temple Street, north of the Old Constitution building. Granted.

The special committee to whom was referred the petition of a number of residents of the Nineteenth Ward, praying that measures be taken to prevent Mr. H. Snell from running acids from his soap factory into the water ditch furnishing them with water for culinary purposes, reported that they had examined the matter complained of and had found it difficult to carry off this deleterious matter through any other source, unless it be run north into Pugsley's mill race, on Fourth West Street, and as this will satisfy the petitioners, the committee recommend that the supervisor be instructed to put in a culvert across the first street north of Mr. Snell's factory and that the refuse matter be carried away in this manner. The report also stated that Mr. Snell had expressed his regrets at the subject having been brought before the Council, and that he was on hand to comply with the desires of his neighbors.

The committee to whom was referred the motion of Alderman A. H. Raleigh relative to the bringing of sidewalks on certain specified streets, to the established grade, etc., reported recommending that the Council proceed with the matter in accordance with the ordinance governing it, and that the improvements desired be proceeded with as rapidly as possible, beginning with the district within the fire limits. Report accepted and recommendation thereof adopted.

The Recorder, in compliance with a motion passed at the last sitting of the Council, made a report relative to the salaries of certain city officers and those of Councilors and Aldermen. Salaries of Aldermen and Councilors were, on motion, fixed on the same basis as has been customary heretofore.

A motion was then made relative to the salaries of city officers, which on yeas and nays being taken, was referred to the committee of the whole.

The bill for an ordinance governing the distribution of waters flowing into the city, which was referred to the committee on revision was reported back and its consideration resumed. The bill was again laid over for one week.

A bill for an amendment to the ordinance on signs and awnings incorporating the request of certain dealers to use two-and-a-half feet of the sidewalk, on which to display their goods, etc., was read and laid over for one week.

The Council adjourned until next Tuesday evening.

Grand Jury.—The grand jury have settled down to work, and one result of their prompt action is the arrest of Joseph Bush for stealing a horse from Hon. Lester J. Herrick, of Ogden. As will be seen by reference to the court proceedings, Bush plead guilty to the charge.

Third District Court.—Proceedings in the Third District Court, yesterday, M. Schaeffer, Chief Justice, presiding:

The People, etc, vs. Joseph Bush; grand larceny; arraigned and plead guilty.

Henry Collings vs. Joseph Marion et al.; order for summons to issue on the amended complaint.

Arie Pinedo vs. W. Nelson; Phelan and Hayes allowed to enter as intervenors; petition filed.

Missionaries in England.—Through a private letter we learn that the missionaries who left this city during the early part of last month, have been assigned by Pres. Wm. Badge, to the following fields of labor. Elders Geo. H. Taylor and Henry Rampton to the London Conference, Elders A. M. Buchanan and Wm. Haigh to the Liverpool Conference, Elders Hugh Watson and Ed. E. Brain to the

Manchester Conference, Elder Geo. Crane to the Durham and New Castle Conferences, Elder Hyrum Bennion to the Bristol Conference, Elder John F. Miller to the Nottingham Conference, and Elder Joseph R. Mathews to Wales.

Sad Accident.—Yesterday afternoon, about 2 o'clock, a young man named B. W. Hodgett, aged about 21 years, went to the gravel bed just north of the cemetery for a load. He backed his wagon up under an overhanging bank, from which spot, a few moments after, a loud rumbling noise was heard by two boys who were also getting gravel near by. One of them ran to the place, and was horrified to find that young Hodgett was buried beneath the mass, his hand only being uncovered. The frightened lad immediately started for assistance, and soon returned with two men, who dug the unfortunate man out as soon as possible. They were too late, however, life was extinct. The mother of the deceased is just recovering from a severe sickness, and the young man was paying for the physician's attendance by hauling for him. The body was taken to the sexton's office, it being feared that the shock to the invalid mother would prove fatal if the corpse were taken home. An inquest was held on the remains last evening.

Accidents in Ogden.—"Semper," our Ogden correspondent, writes that the young man Geo. Ensign, injured by the ditching of the train a few days since, was yesterday lying very low, being speechless, deathly pale, and in a stupor from which he was not expected to arouse. "Semper" called several times to see the sufferer, who died at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It was discovered that his spine was injured, and his death was thus hastened. He was 21 years of age, of good morals, and widely respected.

Yesterday afternoon another fatal accident occurred, a young man named Frank Lougee, on his way to San Francisco, fell from the platform of a moving train and was run over by three cars. His body was frightfully mangled, his legs being both broken and almost severed from his body. He died about 4.30 p.m. A number of letters, etc., found on his person, gave information of his parents and relatives, who will be communicated with. The body was to be interred in the Ogden cemetery to-day.
