

GEN. J. S. CLARKSON WILL LOSE HIS JOB

Secy. MacVeagh Announces That
He Will Not Be Reappointed
Surveyor of Port of N. Y.

POLITICIANS WANT PLACE.

Tim Woodruff Has Been After His
Scalp—General's Sugar Record
Very Fine.

Washington, Nov. 22.—Positive announcement that Gen. James S. Clarkson, surveyor of the port of New York, would not be reappointed to that office was made by Secy. of the Treasury MacVeagh today. The decision against the retention of the former political carrier from Iowa in one of the choicest billets in the federal service in New York state will not surprise those familiar with political conditions. Secy. MacVeagh already has Gen. Clarkson's successor in mind, but is not prepared to make any announcement.

When Secy. MacVeagh was inducted into the cabinet he went to the White House on the first day of his official career and there met Timothy Woodruff, former lieutenant governor of New York, who, it is said, demanded Gen. Clarkson's official seal. The president was not inclined to acquiesce, but it was understood at that time that Mr. Clarkson would not continue in office beyond Jan. 1.

The trouble is said to have its origin in the desire of upper state Republican politicians for patronage. The office pays \$5,000 a year.

Gen. Clarkson was for many years one of the notable factors in the Republican ranks of the country. When he was appointed to the New York office in 1902 by President Roosevelt, his nomination was confirmed only after much delay in the senate.

CLARKSON DOESN'T WANT ANOTHER TERM

New York, Nov. 22.—James S. Clarkson, surveyor of the port of New York, issued the following statement tonight: "I have had two terms of the office and two terms are enough for me. I did not desire another term, as is generally known, and for more than a year have been arranging to go into business, a fact which has been publicly announced several times in the last few months."

A close friend of Mr. Clarkson said tonight that developments would show that the action taken at Washington today could be associated with the sugar fraud investigation and that there would be some interesting disclosures in Mr. Clarkson's favor.

Richard Parr, government employee, who asserts that he is the original exposé of the sugar frauds, declined to comment on the case tonight, although the friend of Mr. Clarkson referred to Parr as the man who would give some valuable information.

Mr. Clarkson's first federal office was as postmaster at Des Moines, Ia. Several years later he went to Washington as first assistant postmaster-general. In 1902 he was made surveyor of customs at this port by President Roosevelt. Mr. Clarkson was chairman of the Republican national committee from 1890 to 1892.

SYSTEMATIC LOOTING WALLA WALLA STORES

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 22.—Systematic looting of 12 business houses of Walla Walla within the past 30 days of goods valued at approximately \$5,000 was brought to an end yesterday by the arrest and subsequent confession of Frank Stahl, 12 years old, son of Mrs. Frank Stahl, a wealthy and prominent widow of this city.

Stahl is held in custody by the city authorities, his mother having refused to furnish bail. His arrest followed the finding of his watch and fob lying on the floor of one of the stores he entered two weeks ago. Stahl was shadowed by the police and caught early Monday morning in the act of burglarizing a hardware store.

BRYAN DENOUNCES COPPER MERGER

Says it is Combine That Will
Seriously Injure Interests of
Smaller Producer.

CRITICIZES PRESIDENT TAFT

For Advice to People of Arizona to
Avoid Copying the Okla-
homa Constitution.

Globe, Ariz., Nov. 22.—William J. Bryan, who was the guest of honor at a banquet here last night, denounced the proposed copper merger as a combine which would seriously injure the interests of the smaller producers and the working men.

He also criticized President Taft for his reported advice to avoid copying the Oklahoma constitution when the people of this territory come to draft the basic law of the prospective new state.

"Do not let the president of the United States threaten you," he said. "Let him not tell you that he does not want a constitution like that of Oklahoma. It is much better that the constitution should fit the people of the new state than the people outside."

"It is my earnest wish for your sake that the constitution of Arizona will be for its people and not for those citizens of Ohio, who are simply temporary residents here."

EQUAL FRANCHISE SOCIETY TO BE NATIONALIZED

New York, Nov. 22.—Mrs. Clarence H. Mackay will make the Equal Franchise society, of which she is president, a national organization with offices in the larger cities throughout the country. To this end a committee has been appointed by Mrs. Mackay and work will be commenced in spreading the suffrage propaganda. An appropriation of \$1,000 has been made to rent offices and buy literature.

ELLIS ISLAND MATRON DEAD.

New York, Nov. 22.—Many thousands of immigrants who have passed into this country through this port will recall Mrs. Regina Stucklen, the matron at Ellis Island, who has just died at her home in Brooklyn. For more than 25 years she had been assistant matron or matron of the old Castle Garden, and on Ellis Island. Because of the interest she took in the poor aliens coming to this country, she became known as the "Mother of the Immigrants."

ABE ATTELL BEATS JIMMY MORAN

Memphis, Tenn., Nov. 22.—Abe Attehl, featherweight champion of the world, was given the decision over Jimmy Moran of Brooklyn in an eight-round contest tonight. Moran, while outclassed in speed, science and ring generalship at the start, proved his stamina.

Not until the fifth round did Attehl extend himself. From then on he made a chopping block of his rugged opponent. Moran possessed a vicious right swing, but only once, in the second round.

San Bernardino, Cal., Nov. 22.—Robert Cooper and two nephews arrived here today from Oraibi, on the Arizona-New Mexico boundary, bringing information that settlers are feeling from a threatened uprising of the Hopi Indians. Robert Butler, one of the men, said that for weeks the in-

dians have been restless and last week they ordered the settlers to leave the region. Their warlike demonstration caused a general stampede.

All the homesteaders who have not left the country have sent their families away and have united to protect their cattle.

FIFTEEN PRISONERS HANGED.

Saratov, European Russia, Nov. 22.—Fifteen prisoners were hanged here today. Two men convicted of lynching have been condemned to death.

BROKE WINDOW. GRABBED TWO TRAYS OF JEWELRY

Chicago, Nov. 22.—The jewelry store of Jensen Brothers was robbed of jewelry valued at \$2,900 last night when two thieves threw a brick through one of the show windows and grabbed two trays containing watches and diamonds.

R. J. Jensen, one of the members of

the firm, was in the store at the time and he chased the thieves for a block before they escaped.

PARALYZED WHILE PUTTING ON WEDDING GOWN

Redding, Cal., Nov. 22.—While Miss May E. Woffert was putting on her wedding gown yesterday for her marriage to George Gattler, she was stricken with paralysis. The guests had already assembled to celebrate the nuptials. When news of the tragedy was brought to the bridegroom and guests Gattler was nearly overcome and the laughing crowd was instantly changed to a weeping gathering.

SENATOR CULLOM'S EIGHTIETH BIRTHDAY

Washington, Nov. 22.—Senator Cullom yesterday celebrated his 80th

birthday. Many friends called and several sent remembrances. Several hundred letters and telegrams were received.

No birthday party was attempted. When the regular hour for dinner arrived it was served without any guests being present.
