WAS UP TODAY.  
GOOD ORE IN THE  
LOWER MAMMOTH

The Stock Sold on the Exchange  
Up to 25s.

Exactly 15,000 shares of stock were sold on the exchange today for \$7,350. Grand Central, Yale and Yankee Con. show gains. Con. Mercur also sold at higher figures today, though it is difficult to see the reason for the advance. Two 100-share lots changed hands at \$4.80 and 44 1/2 per share. Grand Central, which sold at \$3.50 yesterday, moved up to \$3.55 today on the rumor that the directors will declare a dividend in November.

Value opened at 12½ and sold up to 12½ closed weaker, however. The activity in this stock is apparently caused by the feeling in some quarters that Mr. Kearns is at the back of the movement to build a smelter at the mine. A great deal of uncertainty exists regarding the property and it is believed that the market has been abounding in rumors since the last jump.

Mammuth sold up to \$2.22 today, though only 200 shares changed hands. Daily-West shows a falling off for some reason. Sales were made today as low as \$1.85. May Day got 300 shares on a bid of 20, while Sacramento sold 100 at \$1.90.

Star Con. did business as low as 55¢, and Sunbeam fell off to 42.

Joe Bowers was active at 3, while Yankee Con. was stronger today. From 29¢ the stock advanced to 35¢.

Daily released 100 shares at \$1.80, while Dexter participated at \$1.65.
