## WORK DONE ON NEW STATE HIGHWAY

Weber County's Portion of Mac-  
adam Road Nearly Completed  
To Davis Co. Line.

## TRAMP STABS ED. BOYCE.

Extensive Pipe Line Improvements  
Commenced—W. M. De Witt  
Run Down by Auto.

OGDEN, Oct. 4.—Work on the new  
road in Weber county to the  
Davis county line is nearly completed.  
This road, which is made of macadam  
and will be one of the finest stretches  
of country road to be found in the  
west. It will be a boon to automobilists  
and to all lines of industry which  
require much drayage, such as canning  
factories, sugar factories and the like,  
it will be a pleasure to all. It will be  
greatly benefited by the extensive im-  
provements on this new highway. Each  
county through which it passes, will  
be for its proportionate part of the  
work, although the last state legisla-  
ture made an appropriation of \$27,000,  
which will be divided among the coun-  
ties contributing to the expense of this  
highway.

## TRAMP STABS ED. BOYCE.

OGDEN, Oct. 4.—Ed. Boyce, a bar-  
keeper, was severely cut by an unknown  
tramp in the Central saloon on Twenty-  
fifth street on Saturday night because  
he refused to buy the stranger a drink.  
Boyce and a number of his friends were  
standing at the bar, drinking, when the  
tramp came up and asked for a drink.  
Boyce refused to buy him one and the  
tramp turned and went out of the door.  
In a few minutes he re-entered and  
went up behind Boyce, stabbed him in  
the back, near the left shoulder  
blade, with a stiletto. Boyce turned  
about and the fellow cut him across  
the forehead, and was knocked to the  
floor by Boyce before he could again  
get up. But for the interference of  
 bartender Ed. Maguire, Boyce would  
have been killed. The man with a chair as  
a weapon on the floor. He managed to get  
up and make a hasty retreat out of  
the door and has not been seen since.  
The police station was notified and  
Boys went in search of a doctor who  
made seven stitches in the cut on his  
forehead and nine in the cut on his  
back.

## PIPE LINE IMPROVEMENTS.

OGDEN, Oct. 4.—The big pipe line in  
Ogden canyon, which has for years  
been the marvel of the engineering  
world, and which every year has  
brought many of the most noted en-  
gineers from all countries to inspect it,  
is about to undergo some very extensive  
improvements. Since the first part of  
August the Utah Light & Railway com-  
pany have been receiving shipments of  
structural iron and great reels of steel  
cable, and now the company, under  
the direction of its most efficient en-  
gineers, are preparing to erect several  
iron towers, and before long por-  
tions of the great pipe will be sup-  
ported by powerful suspension-like  
towers of steel cable. The work is being  
started at the point above the Lewis  
cave, where the first accident occurred  
last spring and it is thought that the  
method of supporting the pipe will  
solve a very serious problem which has  
plagued the pipe for several years.  
Every time the loose earth settles or  
slides along the route of the pipe,  
during the time the cables are being  
laid under the pipe, the water  
will be shut off and the Pioneer sta-  
tion, at the mouth of Ogden canyon,  
will be closed down.

## REPUBLICANS NOMINATE COUNCIL

Prohibition Dominant Issue—Dele-  
gates Nominated to City Convention  
Saturday Next.

(Special Correspondence.)

PROVO, Oct. 4.—The Republicans  
held primaries Friday evening in the  
various wards to nominate councilmen  
and elect delegates to the city conven-  
tion to be held Saturday, Oct. 9. The  
following are the nominees for council-  
men:  
First Ward—H. E. Allen.  
Second Ward—Andrew Knudsen.  
Third Ward—A. W. Harding.  
Fourth Ward—George Fowler.  
Fifth Ward—J. Challen Smith.  
Knudsen and Fowler are members  
of the present council.  
Resolutions pledging the nominees  
for councilmen and the delegates to the  
city convention to prohibition were  
passed in all the wards, except the  
Third ward, where they were not pre-  
sented.

In the Fourth ward a high license  
and strict regulation resolution in op-  
position to the prohibition resolution  
was introduced, but defeated. In the  
Fifth ward considerable opposition to  
the prohibition resolution was ex-  
pressed but not enough to defeat it.  
The retiring councilman in the Third  
ward, C. H. Miller, was tendered a  
vote of thanks by his services in the  
council. In this ward in which the  
delegation is unpledged, the anti-pro-  
hibitionists have about one-half of the  
delegates. There is, however, no doubt,  
that the convention will pass a prohibi-  
tion resolution, as will also the Demo-  
cratic convention, in which the second  
ward delegation unpledged.

The anti-prohibitionists, or some of  
them—it is not known that definite  
united action has been taken—say that  
if both parties adopt a prohibition plat-  
form, they will put a high license and  
strict regulation ticket in the field.  
Even if they should do that, they will  
have to elect all the councilmen in or-  
der to repeal the prohibition ordinance  
already passed, which goes into effect  
Jan. 1, 1910, for of the hold-over coun-  
cilmen there are only two who are anti-  
prohibitionists, that is, if a prohibition  
mayor is elected who, of course, will  
veto a high license ordinance, and it  
would take seven councilmen to pass  
the high license ordinance over his  
veto. If a high license mayor is elected,  
the anti-prohibitionists could lose  
one councilman and still enact a high  
license and strict regulation ordinance.  
But as it is fairly well demonstrated  
that about 90 per cent of the voters  
favor prohibition, there does not seem  
to be much chance for the high license  
people to succeed under any possible  
combination of circumstances.
