Milan Packard reached town this morning from the Star Con, of Tintic: He brought along some very fine look-1% 3% 1.04 ing samples of spar ore from a new strike between the 200 and 300 levels, Mr. Packard was feeling very jubilant over the developments in two places on the north vein below the 200 level. In one place the drills have been working for several days in what is said to be a big body of shipping ore. A chamber about 10 feet wide has been cut out and the top, sides and bot-tom show solid ore carrying from 20 to 60 ounces silver per ton with 6 to 7 per cent lead, \$4.00 to \$5.00 gold and 3 per cent copper. Two cars of ore have been extracted from the strike which will be on the market early next week. In another place nearer the 300 level Mr. Packard says a fine chute of similar ore is being opened up. In addi-tion to the above metals the ore shows a plentiful sprinkling of iron pyrites.

### WORLD'S METAL OUTPUT.

#### Report Just Issued from Washington Covering the Year 1900.

A dispatch from Washington, says: Director Roberts of the mint has prepared a statement showing the production of the precious metals for the tion of the precious metals for the calendar year of 1900. It shows that the production of gold in the world that year was 12,457,287 ounces, of the value of  $\frac{255}{514}$ ,500, n less in value of  $\frac{44}{5}$ . 670,000 from 1899. The loss was mainly in the Transvaal field and due to the war. The production of South Africa in 1899 was of the value of  $\frac{373}{277.100}$ , and in 1890,  $\frac{39}{54}$ ,000. The principal gains were  $\frac{18}{5}$ ,  $\frac{318}{500}$ ,000 in the United States and  $\frac{5}{5}$ ,  $\frac{500}{500}$ ,000 in Canada. SILVER OUTPUT.

The sliver output of the world amounted to 178,736,796 fine ounces, the largest ever known. It exceeds the product of 1899 by 11.572,513 ounces. The product of 1829 by 11.572.513 ounces. The United States again leads all other producers, with a slight excess over Mexico.
