GARDNER IS UNEASY. George Wants Old Man Fitz to Come Down Some Pounds. New York, July 31.-If any match is to be arranged between George Gardner and Hob Fitzsimmons the weight question will have to be agreed upon first. ### San Francisco, July 31 .- Capt. John J. Pershing, Fifteenth cavalry, leader of the American expedition which rossed Mindanao and brought into eaceable relations with the United States the Moros, who for three hun-dred years had opposed Spanish inva-sion, has arrived here from the ori-ent. ### Red Paint to Color Tomatoes.

Philadelphia, July 31 .- State Dairy and Food Commissoner Warren has anounced that retail grocers here recently have received among the orders for canned tomatoes, packages which upon close examination proved to be a miscellaneous assortment of vegetables including a few green tomatoes, and red paint, the whole having the appearance of ripe tomatoes. Agents de-tailed to investiate found that red paint was used to a great extent in coloring worthless and unripe tomatoes, and that other coloring matter was also worthless canned vegetables of various kinds.
