CONCLUDED TO RETURN

A Report Which Attracts Attention
and is Generally Believed.

NOW THE POCCETTO RUMOR WAS STARTED.

The Qualities of the Soldiers Necessary
Make a Speedy and Decisive
Action.

By Telegram to the News.

GENERAL BELIEVED THAT THE HOSTILES
WILL COME IN.

PIKE RIDGE AGENT, Jan. 10.—The
present position of the hostiles has
already made up their minds to re-
turn to the agency, and there is no
doubt of what has been said. It is
not a report, but a general, definite,
absolute, and well founded information.

It is now, however, gen-
erally believed. According to the al-
leged program, the hostiles are
now moving toward the agency, and
the majority of the mission near the
beginning of the engagement between Gen.
Fife and the Indians on the 29th.

They will be met by a de-
parture from the agency and scattered to
the four winds.

It has not yet been determined where
or when the Indians will be dispersed.
In fact it is generally believed that
the Indians will be scattered to the
various ranches, abandoned trading
posts, and other places.

Some have also been scattered to
the contrary and utterly false."

He recommends that the Secretary of
War be requested to issue orders to
Gen. Fife to start for the agency.

McCarthy will be sent to the
agency to take charge of the agency.

The selection of a spot in which to
scatter is also a difficult question.

The best cannot be done in the mid-
dle of the agency, neither can it be
done where the ground is broken. The
place must be in the Indian's traditional fighting ground, and, if
possible, of boundary given damage might be
done.

Nowhere else the Indian's
temperament, his love of war, his
desire to fight, and his desire to
win, can be better done than in the
middle of the agency.

The general plan is to
have the Indians moving toward the
agency and at the same time allow
them to do so on such roads which they
may have an advantage over the

hostiles.

General Miles has ordered the dis-
persal of the Indian police, who
have been on guard duty at the
agency, and the Indians are to be
scattered to the various ranches.

General Miles has ordered the
dispersement of the Indian police, who
will supply their places with sol-
diers. This move is curiously inter-
esting, but it seems patent, that
the general wants only while men
are now, almost armed to the
teeth.
