# WADE MURDER JURY FINALLY SECURED.

Taking of Testimony in Chinaman Killing Case to Commence Monday.

### WHO THE LAST TALISMEN ARE.

Looked for a Time as Though Another Venire Would Have to be Issued -A Sudden Change.

The jury in the murder case of the state vs James H. Wade, who shot and killed a Chinaman named Lee Quen You at Alta on Dec. 19, 1903, has fianally been completed. The last jurors were secured about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when all but one of the names in the jury box had been drawn out, and it looked as though another special venire would have to be issued. The last three jurors secured are C. E. Offenback and W. J. Backman of Salt Lake and Adolph Bergen of West

Jardan.

After the jurors had been sworn in, the information was read to them and, upon the suggestion of the attorneys in the case, Judge Morse continued the further hearing of the case until Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The jurors were instructed by the court not to discuss the merits of the case or talk with any one concerning it and were permitted to separate during the recess of the court. of the court.

He called attention to the recurrence of the principal motives and themes of the tetralogy in the closing acts and the deft and remarks closing acts and the deft and remarkable way in which they were at times interwoven with unique melodies and complicated harmonles. The Trauermarch in the third act was an immense erformance, requiring powers of techdynamics that astonished the audience.
Prof. Goldmark is thoroughly absorbed in his subject, and it is doubtful

there is any musician living who has better understanding of the great composer and the spirit which actuated his work. These lectures have certainly been a revelation to the Salt Lake musical public, and Prof. Gold-mark concludes the regular course this evening with a lecture on Die Meister-singer de Nuremburg, Wagner's only comedy, the popularity of which is such as to ensure a large attendance. An extra lecture will be given tomorrow night, by special and persistent request, on the Parsifal, which is claiming so much attention in Europe and at east-ern operatic centers.
