Jonathan Hunt Will Spend Ten Years in Pen for Incest. Special Correspondence.

Loa, Wayne, Co., Nov. 16.—After a deliberation of fifty minutes the jury convicted the man Hunt of the helnous crime of incest with his own daughter Nancy. The jury recommended mercy and the judge limited his sentence to ten years in the state prison, otherwise he would have been given the full limit of the law-fifteen years.

The evidence, though incomplete, disclosed a horrible state of affairs. The man had once stood high in the community; had held high ecclesiastical offices and had three families. All of his wives are now dead and he is left with a large family, many of whom are small children, in most deplorably des-titute circumstances. He is the father of twenty-five children, whom he has treated brutally and harshly, bruising and choking them. He has been domineering and harsh,

He has been domineering and harsh, using his authority with a high hand, especially in his own family. It is said that when his last wife died her last words were, "You will go to hell for this, Jonathan Hunt," she having been made to suffer greatly from harsh treatment in her last illness. With only a moment's warning the city was thrown into confusion—people who could ran as if for their lives. In ten minutes what before was a quiet scene changed into one of frenzied excitement; men, women and children were running. into one of frenzied excitement; men, women and childrine were running, serveaming, fainting and praying as they never were known to before. All were painfully aware that something terrible had happened, but just what they did had happened, but just what they did not know. The shock which struck such a telling blow seemed to come from the east and traveled westward, though there are some who say the course was from southwest to northeast, whichever the case may be it is none the less true that it was fifteen seconds of terrible experience for our people. The crash of falling chimneys and broken glass, the barking of dogs, bellowing of cattle, neighing of horses and cackling of fowls formed a chorus that was awful to hear up to 2:30 a.m. Thursday, during which time the earth never

ceased to tremble, slight and sudden shocks followed in rapid succession and again at 5 o'clock the roar and shock was very perceptible. No one felt like working nor talking except of the terrible experience of the night be-fore, but were thanking that it was no
