

SECY. CORTELYOU MUST SHOW CAUSE

Why He Should Not Be Enjoined
From Delivering Balance of
Panama Canal Bonds.

DISAPPOINTED BIDDER SUES.

George W. Austin of New York Sues
Up His Bid Was Ignored and No
Allotment Made Him.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Justice Gould of the district supreme court today cited George B. Cortelyou, secretary of the treasury, to appear in court Jan. 8 to show cause why he should not be enjoined from turning over or delivering the balance of the \$1,150,000 of the Panama canal bonds to certain banks and persons to whom he has announced allotments. The citation issued by Justice Gould is based on a petition filed by George W. Austin of New York, who describes himself as a taxpayer and property owner in the United States, and who declares he made a proposal to purchase bonds of the advertised issue of face value of \$3,000,000. He avers he had agreed to pay at the rate of \$103.375 and accrued interest per \$100, and on notice of the acceptance of his subscription stands ready to deposit the amount with the assistant treasurer at New York.

Mr. Austin informs the court that he has been advised through the public press that in direct violation of the statutes and in absolute disregard of the treasury department's circular, of the \$25,000,000 of the bonds allotted only \$1,000,000 were allotted to persons who were individual bidders, and who in accordance with the statutes and said circular were given equal opportunity to subscribe therefor; the remaining \$24,000,000 were allotted to divers national banks and only \$2,000,000 of which were offered to banks which had offered a higher price than that bid by him.

been ignored and no allotment made to him, he says he complained to the department, and the response consisted of the secretary's intention to disregard the statutes and thereby commit a malfeasance for which, he says, Mr. Cortelyou is not a man of sufficient means to answer to the citizens of the United States and to him.

In his petition Mr. Austin also refers to the bid of one George A. Roman of New York City, who had com-

plied with the terms of the secretary's circular in every particular, but whose bid was ignored. It is stated that Mr. Roman offered to take bonds for \$1,000,000 at 103.25; \$1,000,000 at 103.50; \$1,000,000 at 103.75, and \$1,000,000 at 104, and that a further bid for \$4,000,000 was made by Mr. Roman at a price of 103.65.

The petition concludes with the declaration that by reason of the secretary's having ignored these bids, "the United States and the citizens thereof, irrespective of the rights of said bidder, had been deprived of and will be deprived of the preservation of several hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Another important branch of the labors of the bureau is the examination of the antiquities of the country, the collection of relics, the mapping and description of the ancient mounds, cliff dwellings, pueblos, and other monuments, and under the law recently passed for the preservation of these monuments, the uncovering, repair and restoration of the important ruins in order that they may be preserved to the public for all time. The recent operations of Doctor Fowkes among the Casa Grande ruins of Arizona is a good example of this work, a ruined town of great interest having been brought to light and made available to students, tourists, and the people generally. In order to assist the government departments having custody of the public domain, in preserving the antiquities, the work of compiling a descriptive catalogue of the sites has been undertaken, and several bulletins relating to this work have already been published.

FINDINGS IN PRINT.

It happens that at present the majority of the members of the bureau's staff are in Washington working up their field operations and preparing the results for publication. The researches of the past summer extended to tribes and antiquities in Alaska, British Columbia, Ontario, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Minnesota, Louisiana and Florida. A large part of the force has been engaged in preparing articles for the Handbook of the Indians, which is a review or summary of all that has been so far collected concerning the tribes. This work is regarded as preliminary to a series of handbooks, treating of several important subdivisions of the subject in greater detail, some of these being already far advanced toward completion. These handbooks relate to the history of the tribes, to the languages, to the arts and industries, to social and governmental institutions, to the religions, to the folk-lore, to the physical and mental characters, to the sign languages, and to the customs and habits. The handbook of languages is now nearly ready for the press and several others are well advanced. Meantime the field investigations are going on in various directions with a view to filling gaps in the information and of making the acquaintance of a larger number of tribes.

Already about 80 volumes have been published. These are comprised in four series: Annual reports, bulletins, contributions to knowledge and miscellaneous. They contain a fund of information available not only to historians and ethnologists but to officials whose duties bring them in touch with all governmental agencies having dealings with the Indian tribes. Although editions of the bureau's works are comparatively limited, they are, like other governmental publications, obtainable through congressional and other sources. The library of the bureau contains some 25,000 volumes, bound and unbound, and 1,500 manuscripts relating to the Indian languages, and the photographic laboratory has upwards of 15,000 negatives, including portraits and views illustrating Indian life.

Recently authority has been granted by the bureau to extend its researches to Hawaii, and the work has been initiated by the preparation of a bibliography of the islands, comprising all titles relating principally to the native people, and an important work on the mythology and history of Hawaii is ready for the press.

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FINANCIAL STRINGENCY.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Senator Culberson today discussed his resolution directing the committee on finance to investigate the causes of the financial stringency. He referred to the messages of the president, in which he suggested the necessity of legislation in the near future, and said that either the president had changed his mind or that Congress was loath to carry out the recommendation.

"I have noticed," said Mr. Culberson, "that statements from Mr. Roosevelt have not always been received with that degree of welcome as was those of his distinguished predecessor, George Washington."

The resolution was referred to the finance committee.

NEW YORK SUNDAYS.

Even Under the New Amusement Ordinance Will Have Blush Tinge.

New York, Dec. 18.—Even if Mayor McClellan signs the new Sunday amusement ordinance as he is expected to do, New York's Sundays will be at least tinged with blue in the future. Theater managers are not quite sure that amusements will be permitted under the new ordinance, and Police Commissioner Bingham has asked the corporation attorney for an opinion on the ordinance. Dancing and regular theatrical performances will not be allowed, and the German, Yiddish and French companies which have been playing on Sunday nights to crowded houses will be forced to close. The vaudeville houses will in all probability open next Sunday, if the ordinance is signed, but the entertainments will consist largely of vocal and instrumental music and moving pictures. Ministers of the city are still fighting for a closed Sunday and have asked the mayor to give them one more hearing before he signs the ordinance passed on Tuesday.
