BALFOUR DESERTS CHAMBERLAIN

Government Decides that the Fiscal Question is Not a Critical Party Issue.

FREE TRADERS HAIL IT WITH JOY

Whips Will Not be Sent Out-Two Power Navy Standard No Longer Applicable.

London, March 21 .- The cabinet meeting today discussed the fiscal situation in the house of commons, and decided that in the future the government will not use pressure upon its followers in regard to the opposition resolutions framed to commit the government on the fiscal question. As a result the resolution announced for the night of March 22, expressing the opposition of the house to a tax on imported manufactured articles, will probably be carried by a comfortable majority, but the opposition will be unable to reap more than an indifferent political benefit.

The decision of the cabinet was backed up to Joseph Chamberlain's followers tonight, when at a meeting of 78 Unionist tariff reformers it was de-cided not to participate in the debates or divisions on the resolution, the vote on which will, however, be interesting

because it will be a "go-as-you-please."

The government having decided that the fiscal question is not a critical party issue, whips will not be sent out. A majority for the resolution will not be considered a defeat for the government whose supporters express themselves as having rejected on March 8 the resolu-tion declaring that in the opinion of the house permanent unity of the British empire could not be secured through a system of preferential duties based on

This move on the part of Premier Balfour is the political sensation of the hour, and is being hailed with great joy

hour, and is being hailed with great joy by free traders, who claim that it is a definite desertion of Mr. Chamber-lain by his former cabinet associates. In the house of lords this evening the navy expenditure was lengthily dis-cussed on the call of the Liberal leader, Earl Spencer, for papers regarding the naval program. He said he did not de-sire to condemn the government, but he sire to condemn the government, but he wanted an explanation of the plans in-

wanted an explanation of the plans involving the withdrawal of such a large number of vessels from the list of vessels which could be commissioned for active service and the reasons for the increased expenditure since 1894-1895.

Viscount Goschen justified the vast increase in the last 15 years. He said the two-power standard was no longer applicable. One thing had been strongly brought out by the Russo-Japanese war, namely, difficulties which might arise with neutrals, and the necessity of maintaining an attitude of dignity and power thereto. Viscount Goschen said he did not think there was any harm in discussing these questions. Chancellor von Buelow was very candid occasionally in remarks with regard to Chancellor von Buelow was very candid occasionally in remarks with regard to European politics. Continuing, Viscount Goschen said when any power with 12 battleships was ready within 100 miles of the English coast, that was the power which must be considered side by side with preparations to meet any two powers with whom Great Brit. any two powers with whom Great Brit-tain might have to deal.

Referring to the loss of Russian warships, Viscount Goschen said it was simply a question of Russia giving orsimply a question of Russia giving orders to great establishments outside of Russia for a renewal of her navy. He did not think the fact that Russia had lost five battleships was a circumstance sufficient to justify the arrest of Great Britain's shipbuilding program.

The first lord of the admiralty, the Earl of Selborne, said the increased expenditure was due to the fact that the whole naval aspect of the world, east and west, had changed. Within the past 13 years new navies had sprung up. Russia had recently suffered great losses, but the fleet of Japan had come

up. Russia had recently suffered great losses, but the fleet of Japan had come into existence; America and Germany had evolved navies of equal strength and efficiency, while the great French navy had maintained its efficiency. Great Britain was not forcing the pace in shipbuilding, but was merely taking into account what other nations were doing and a two and possibly three into account what other nations were doing and a two and possibly three power standard must be maintained. The British navy stood close between their manhood and conscription. The navy supported Great Britain's fiscal policy. Lord Selborne, added that the principal explanation of his navy policy was that for administrative economy he had thought it unadvisable to waste money on ships about to become ineffective.

Lord Selbourne, in concluding, point-ed out that in the West Indies the whole naval strategical situation had undergone a complete revolution since the Carnarvon commission sat, owing to the birth of the American navy. At Hord Selborne's request Lord Spencer withdrew his motion for pa-

POLICE FORCE OF INDIA.

Scheme Formed to Reorganize And Strengthen It.

London, March 22 .- The Daily Mail's London, March 22.—The Daily Mail's Calcutta correspondent reports that a scheme has been sanctioned to reorganize and strengthen the Indian police at a cost of \$5,000,000 yearly, with a view to rendering the police capable of holding the country in an emergency thus releasing the troops for work at the front. The total present strength of the native police is 150,000, but only 50,000 are equipped with firearms. It is officered by white men.

Rome, March 21.—Cardinal Gotti, prefect of the propaganda, has instructed Cardinal Martinelli to report on the case presented by Princess Rospigliosi, formerly Marie Jennings Reed of New Orieans, for the annulment of her first marriage with Col. Fred H. Parkhurst, Bangor, Me. The case will soon be discussed before the congregation of the propaganda. It is generally believed by ecclesiastical authorities that an annulment will be granted, as even admitting that the Parkhurst-Reed marriage was celebrated with a dispensariage was celebrated with a dispensa-tion which considered him a Protestant, the marriage is null and void, it being now established that Col. Parkhurst never was baptized.

According to a high official of the embassy whom the Daily Chronicle interviewed, the present moment is considered most opportune to arrive at such an understanding, the Russo-Japanese war having entirely changed the politiwar having entirely changed the politi-cal situation. Germany, this official said, had reason to consider the Fran-co-Russian alliance, as directed against herself and in that case the motive of herself and in that case the motive of German overtures to France might have been misjudged. Now, however, it will be impossible for Russia to engage in war with Germany for years to come, even if she wished, and therefore if the question of revenge is buried there is nothing to prevent Germany and France shaking hands and inaugurating an era of peace and good will. and France shaking hands and inaugurating an era of peace and good will. Prince Henry's visit to France to see the James Gordon Bennett automobile cup race will be the first official visit of a Prussian prince since the war, and the relations of the two countries never have been better. JAPAN FEELS FINANCIAL DRAIN

War Expenditure Has Already Reached Five Thousand Million Yen.

A BIG SCANDAL HAS DEVELOPED

Over Building of Barracks - Press Much Worked Up Over Matter, and Covernment Attacked.

Victoria, B. C., March 21 .- Advices received by the steamer Hyades today state that Japan is feeling keenly the financial drain because of the war, and much poverty is reported. Baron Sone, minister of finance, in a speech at Tokio, said the war expenditure had already reached five thousand million yen, yet, he said, the nation stands well the strain.

In the session of the diet just closed bills involving 70,000,000 yen increased taxation, added to 62,000,000 yen of the previous diet, were passed; also public loan bills amounting to 1,390,000,000

yen.

The Japanese press is worked up with regard to the scandal in the diet arising out of the boodling of Okura & Co., with regard to the building of barracks in Hokkiado. The government is attacked because the contract, which is shown to have given the contractors a large "graft," was awarded without tenders.

Further orders for locomotives are being sent to America to augment the number built in Japan for the roads built since the war in Korea and Manchuria. A new line is projected to connect Witsu with Newchwang.

An expedition may be sent from Hokklado to capture the island of Saghalien, regarding which the Japaness feel

lien, regarding which the Japanese feel that they were cheated when Russia forced an exchange for the Kuriles. The Japanese shared the fishing privileges, which amounted to \$1,500,000 a year, which amounted to \$1,500,000 a year, with the Russians, until recently, and now strong petitions are being made to the Japanese government to recapture Saghalien. May 7 is the thirtieth anniversary of its occupation by the Russians, and demonstrations are being made seeking to have it retaken by that date. It is probable that an expedition will be sent, coincident with the movement against Vladivostok.

Russia Must Have Peace.

New York, March 22.—Prince Ouktomsky, editor of Viedmosti, has declared that peace is imperative because there is no bread for the army, says a Herald dispatch from St. Petersburg. All the grain accumulated at Harbin is asserted to have been taken to Mukden or was transported south by Chinese.

FUNERAL OF GEN. HAWLEY. Notable Gathering of Prominent Men Honors His Memory.

Hartford, Conn., March 21.—The fu-neral of Gen. Joseph R. Hawley, for-mer United States senator, held here today, brought together a notable gathering of men prominent in public and business life. For three hours today the body lay in state in the rontanda of the state capitol.

The general assembly met and ad-

journed as a mark of respect to the memory of Gen. Howley, and immedi-ately afterward a joint memorial ser-vice was held in the house chamber. Senator O. H. Platt delivered a eulogy of his former colleague.

assembly was then adjourned, and the body was removed to th Asylum Hill Congregational church, escorted by the First regiment Connecticut National Guard and veterans of the G. A. R., and religious services were held in the
