WASHINGTON, S. A. letter from the

United States Consul at Win-

neapolis, says, near Sitting Bull's

encampment a war party of twenty-

seven Sioux, composed of three

gangs of power and one bag of bul-

lets. Besides Sitting Bull's band

there is an equal number of Sioux

refugees from the Minnesota mas-

sacre, and the latter who still

seems to exercise much influence.

Appointment.

John P. Winter of Illinois has

been appointed consul at Ritten-

dam.

Grand Review.

There was a fine review of sailors

and marines at the navy yard this

afternoon, which was attended by

the President and Cabinet and

many persons of prominence in mil-

itary and naval circles. The Pres-

ident was greeted with a salute by

the band.

Philadelphia, S. W. H. Kem-

ble publishes a card saying that a

contract was in 1868 entered into

with Schurz by which he was to re-

ceive \$500 per week for his services

in the political campaign in Penn-

sylvania, and that the sum was

actually paid him; and also that in

1868, after returning home from one

week's tour in Pennsylvania, Schurz

drew on the Chairman of the State

Committee for \$500, which

draft was duly honored.

Trying to Make a Strike.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., S. A. Maho-

ney city, this morning, a number

of men and boys with drums en-

tered the town trying to get up a

meeting and start a strike at the

mine. The sheriff's posse ordered

them to disperse, which they did,

running in all directions. Two of

the leaders were arrested.

Thrown from the Train.

SEDAIA, Mo., S. The train on

and twelve persons were injured;

Ship Sinking.

NEW YORK, S. The steamship

Denmark has been ordered seized

upon her arrival from Liverpool,

the charge being that she is car-
