VS. DARTMUUTH'S DEFENSE Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 14.-Har-vard's offense overcame the stubborn Dartmouth defense in the last part of the second half of their annual football game in the stadium today, and by a splendid demonstration of all forms of attack the crimson won, 6 to 0. Dart-mouth fought firecely, and during the first half the rival clevens appeared-evenly matched, but in the second half the superior weight of the erimson team enabled it to pierce the Hanover-ians line for substantial gains. The story of Harvard's single touch-down is a story of onslaught that could not be resisted. Receiving the ball on their own 22-yard line, the crimson carried it right down the field to the Dartmouth goal line. The brunt of the work of the victori-ous cleven fell on the men behind the line, eight of whom played in the game, Corbett distinguished himself at left halfback, and when he had used all his strength in teling rlunges at the green line, Leslie took his place and repeated the performance. White and Long were also ground-gamers, while Kennard's punting and Verweb's line plays were notable.
