

BERRIES WASTED ON DRAPER FARM

Salt Lake Retailers Kept the
Price Down to Fruit
Growers.

INTERURBAN WOULD HELP.

William Kraak Says That Electric
Line to Draper Would Stop the
High Prices on Fruits.

At the Zion fruit farm, east of Draper, William Kraak has subbed a barren hillside, and now it consists of acres and acres of fruit trees and berry bushes. Mr. Kraak makes long journeys daily to Salt Lake with these berries in season, and he is most enthusiastic in pointing out that an interurban road, affording a ready access to the Salt Lake market would place fruits and berries here in great abundance at a price much under that at present maintained in the retail stores. What he has done can be done on hundreds of acres of land near his that is just as fertile.

This year a large portion of Mr. Kraak's berry crop went to waste while Salt Lake enjoyed a fruit famine because the price paid by the Salt Lake retailers who raised the price to consumers to a prohibitive point, did not make it worth while to have them picked. Blackberries, raspberries and dewberries were wasted in large quantities, while peaches and apples were not marketed because of a partial failure of the crop. ELIAS G. MATTHEWS DEAD.

Familiar Figure On Salt Lake Streets
Will Be Missed.

A familiar figure on the Salt Lake streets will be missed in the death yesterday of Elias G. Matthews, brother of Mrs. O. J. Hollister, and half-brother of Vice President Schuyler Colfax, at the residence of Mrs. Hollister, 1237 Seventh East street. Mrs. Hollister left today with the remains for South Bend, Ind., where the wife and child of Mr. Matthews are buried, as he desired to be laid away by his family.

The deceased was born at South Bend, Ind., in 1842, and spent the early part of his life in that state, but after death had taken away his family, he came west as far as Denver where he went into the real estate business, removing later to Salt Lake, where he continued in the same line. His mother was the mother of Schuyler Colfax, who having married again after the death of Colfax, Sr. O. J. Hollister, Mr. Matthews' brother-in-law, is entombed at Riverside cemetery, Denver.

TRUSTS IN IDAHO.

That State Watching Utah Investigation Hoping to Gain Pointers.

Idaho is watching the Salt Lake fight on the food trust, with the hope of profiting by it when it comes to enacting laws at the next legislative session. The Boise Statesman, editorially, calls attention to the Utah situation in the following comment:

It is apparent that the people of Salt Lake have awakened to the enormity of the conspiracy organized against them by the food trusts. The papers are full of the subject, and the preceding story is being produced in such a manner that it may find it necessary to inaugurate a process.

These local trusts are highlanded; they are more coldblooded than Rockefeller or any other of the great trust magnates ever dared to be. They are banded together to literally hold the community up and compel it to pay for their selfishness, and they will hesitate at nothing.

Idaho hopes Utah will go to the problem with a determination to perform the job thoroughly. The same evils exist here, and our people will give Utah all the moral support they can in the hope that they, in turn, will be able to move to the enactment of an anti-trust law in this state at the next session of the legislature.

BOUNDARIES OF VARIOUS SCHOOLS

Pupils Required to Attend in
District Where They
Reside.

The boundaries of the various schools of the city have been determined upon and announced as follows:

Unless otherwise specified, the boundary line extends along the middle of each street designated.

Pupils are required to attend the school in the district in which they reside. Applications for transfers cannot be considered until after schools have opened and the probable attendance in the different buildings has been determined. It is a decided advantage to both the school and the pupil for all pupils to register on the opening day.

The school age is 6 to 18 years.

Bonneville School, North Salt Lake—The Bonneville will receive pupils as heretofore.

BRYANT.

Bryant School—First South between Seventh and Eighth East streets. The Bryant will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, excepting primary pupils as are included in the Twelfth district, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Second and N streets, thence south along N street to South Temple, thence east along South Temple to Tenth East, thence south along Tenth East to Second, thence west along Second to Fifth East, thence north along Fifth East to South Temple, thence east along South Temple to I street, thence north along I street to First street, thence east along First street to J street, thence north along J street, thence east along Second to N, the point of beginning.

EMERSON.

Emerson School—Barclay and Young streets.

The Emerson will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Seventh East and Barclay avenue, thence east to Ninth East, thence north to Herbert avenue, thence east to Tenth East, thence north to Ninth South, thence east to city boundaries, thence to the southern boundary, thence west along southern boundary to Seventh East, thence north to point of beginning.

FRANKLIN.

Franklin School—Second South and Seventh West.

The Franklin school will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of First South and Sixth West, thence south along Sixth West to Fourth South, thence west along Fourth South to city boundary, thence north along city boundary to First South, thence east along First South to Sixth West, the point of beginning.

Transfers issued to the Franklin school last year will be honored at the opening of schools this year.

FREMONT.

Fremont School—Second West between First and Second South streets.

The Fremont will receive pupils, first to sixth grade inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of West Temple and Second South, thence south along West Temple to Second South, thence east to Main street, thence south to Fourth South, thence west to Second West, thence north to Third West, thence west to Fourth West, thence north to Second South, thence east to West Temple, the point of beginning.

SEVENTH AND EIGHTH GRADE PUPILS residing in the Fremont district will attend the Lincoln, Union or Lafayette at their discretion.

GRANT.

Grant School—First West between Sixth and Seventh South streets.

The Grant will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Fourth South and Main, thence south to Fifth South, thence east to state, thence north to Sixth South, thence south to Sixth South, thence west to Third West, thence north to Sixth South, thence east to Second West, thence north to Fifth South, thence east to Fourth South, thence east to Main, the point of beginning.

HAMILTON.

Hamilton School—Eighth South and Eighth East streets.

The Hamilton will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Sixth South and the eastern boundary of the city, thence south to Ninth South, thence west to Tenth East, thence south to Eleventh East, thence west to Ninth East, thence south to Burley avenue, thence west along Burley avenue to Liberty park, thence through Liberty park to the intersection of First East and Williams avenue, thence west along Williams avenue to Fourth East, thence along Fourth East to Eighth East, thence east to Fifth East, thence north to Sixth South, thence east along Sixth South to point of beginning.

JACKSON.

Jackson School—First North between Sixth and Seventh West streets.

The Jackson will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Third North and the Oregon Short Line tracks, thence south along Oregon Short Line tracks to South Temple, thence east to Main street, thence north to point of beginning.

Lafayette School—State street between North Temple and East North Temple. The Lafayette will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, excepting such pupils as are included in the Twelfth district, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of B and the city boundary line south along B to South Temple (both sides of the street), thence east on South Temple to Fourth East, thence south to First South, thence west to Second East, thence west to West Temple, thence north on West Temple to Second North (both sides of the street), thence east to Main street, thence north to April avenue, thence north to Capitol grounds, thence north to North Capitol avenue, thence east to East Capitol avenue, thence east to city boundary, thence east to B street, the point of beginning.

Lake Three school will receive pupils as heretofore.

LINCOLN.

Lincoln School—Fifth South between Third and Fourth West streets.

The Lincoln will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Third South and Second West, thence south to Fourth South, thence east to First West, thence south to Fifth South, thence west to Second West, thence south to Sixth South, thence west to Third West, thence south to Tenth South, thence west to Fifth West, thence north to Seventh South, thence west to Tenth West, thence east to Fourth West, thence south to First South, thence east to Second West, the point of beginning.

LOWELL.

Lowell School—Corner E and Second.

The Lowell school will receive pupils first to eighth B inclusive, excepting such as are included in the Twelfth and Longfellow districts, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of L and the city boundary line, thence south to Second, thence west to J, thence south to First, thence west to I, thence south to South Temple, thence east to Fifth East, thence south to First South, thence west to Fourth East, thence north to South Temple, thence west to B, thence north to city boundary, thence east to L, the point of beginning.

LONGFELLOW.

Longfellow School—First and J streets.

The Longfellow will receive pupils first to fifth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of H and northern boundary of city, thence south to South Temple, thence east to I, thence north to First, thence east to J, thence north to Second, thence east to L, thence north to city boundary, the point of beginning.

ONEQUA.

Onequa School—Fourth North and Tenth West.

The Onequa will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of North North and the Oregon Short Line tracks, thence along the O. S. L. tracks to Third North, thence west to Seventh West, thence south to Simondl avenue (both sides of the street), thence west to Eighth West (both sides of the street), thence south to Second North (both sides of the street), thence west to Ninth West (both sides of the street), thence south to Tenth West, thence west to the Jordan river (both sides of the street), thence north along Jordan river to North North, thence east to O. S. L. tracks, the point of beginning.

OQUIRRH.

Oquirrh School—Fourth East, between Third and Fourth South streets.

The Oquirrh will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, excepting such as are included in the Twelfth district, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of First South and Fifth East, thence south to Second South, thence east to Sixth East, thence west to Sixth South, thence north to Fifth South, thence west to Main, thence east to Second East, north to First South, thence east to Fifth East, the point of beginning.

POPLAR GROVE.

Poplar Grove school will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, from the same district as last year.

Riverside school, Eighth West and Sixth South streets.

The Riverside will receive pupils, first to sixth A inclusive, from the same district last year. Eighth B pupils residing in this district will attend the Franklin school; seventh grade pupils may attend the Franklin or the Poplar Grove schools at their discretion.

SUMNER.

Sumner School—Third East, between Sixth and Seventh South streets.

The Sumner will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Fifth South and Sixth East, thence south to Sixth South, thence east to Fifth East, thence south to Fifth South, thence west to Fourth East, thence south to Ninth South, thence east to Fifth East, thence south to State, thence north to Fifth South, thence east to Fourth East, the point of beginning.

Pupils residing on either side of Fifth South, between Main and Fourth East, and on either side of Fourth East, between Fifth and Sixth South, and on either side of Sixth South, between Fourth and Sixth East, will attend the Oquirrh school.

TWELFTH.

Twelfth School—First South, between Fourth and Fifth East.

The Twelfth will receive pupils, first to fifth B inclusive, residing in the district described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of South Temple and Sixth East, thence south to Second South, thence west to Second East, thence north to South Temple, thence east along South Temple to point of beginning.

Pupils above the fifth residing in the Twelfth district are referred to the boundaries of the Bryant, Oquirrh and Lowell schools.

TRAINING SCHOOL.

Training School, East Bench—The Training school will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of First South and the eastern boundary of city, thence east to Tenth East, thence south to Sixth South, thence east to the eastern boundary line of city.

UNION.

Union School—Third West and First North.

The Union will receive pupils, first to eighth A, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Third

North and O. S. L. tracks, thence south along the O. S. L. tracks to South Temple, thence east to First West, thence South to Second North, thence west to Second West, thence north to Third North, thence west to the O. S. L. tracks.

Pupils residing on either side of Third North, between the O. S. L. tracks and Second West, on either side of Second West, between Third North and Second North, and on either side of Second North, between Second West and First West, will attend the Washington school, likewise those residing on either side of First West, between Second North and First North.

Eighth A pupils residing in the Washington, Grant and Franklin districts will attend the Union school. Eighth A pupils living in any other part of the city may attend the Union if they wish. It will be necessary, however, for such pupils to register on the opening day.

WASATCH.

Wasatch School, R and South Temple—The Wasatch will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the north and east boundaries of the city, thence south to First North (both sides of the street), thence east to First South, thence west to Tenth East, thence west to L, thence north to city boundary line.

Eighth A pupils residing in the Wasatch district may attend Lafayette or Union.

WASHINGTON.

Washington School—First West and Fourth North.

The Washington will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the O. S. L. tracks and Ninth North, thence south along the O. S. L. tracks to Third North, thence east to Second West, thence south to Second North (both sides of the street), thence east to First West (both sides of the street), thence south to First South, thence west to Second West, thence east to West Temple, thence east to Main, thence north to April avenue, thence north to Capitol grounds, thence north to East Capitol, thence north to Ninth North, thence west to O. S. L. tracks, the point of beginning.

WATERLOO.

Waterloo School—Third East and Kensington avenue.

The Waterloo will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Williams avenue and Fifth East, thence west through Williams avenue to State street, thence south to Eleventh South, thence east to Seventh East, thence north to Tenth South, thence

west to Fifth East, thence north to Williams avenue, the point of beginning.

WEBSTER.

Webster School—Eighth East, between Fourth and Fifth South.

The Webster will receive pupils, first to eighth B inclusive, residing in the district bounded as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Second South and Tenth East, thence south to Sixth South, thence west to Sixth East, thence north to Second South, thence east to Tenth East, to point of beginning.

HIGH SCHOOL.

Pupils that have been regularly promoted from the eighth grade from any part of the city will be received in the high school. All certificates of promotion to high school issued by other school systems or issued by private schools must be approved at the office

of the superintendent of schools before their holders will be admitted to the high school without examination.

Pupils that have taken summer courses for the purpose of satisfying high school entrance requirements will be permitted to take the entrance examinations on the presentation of a certificate showing that the prescribed eighth A course has been covered.

KINDERGARTEN.

Kindergarten children will be received in the order of application on the Emerson, Jackson or Washington schools. Such children must be over 4 and under 6 years of age.
