

High Prices on Fruits.

At the Zion fruit farm, east of Draper, William Kraak has subdued a barren hillside, and now it consists of acres and acres of fruit trees and berry bushes. Mr. Kraak makes long journeys daily to Salt Lake with these herries in season, and he is most enthuslastic in pointing out that an interurban road, affording a ready access to the Salt Lake market would place fruits and berries here in great abundance at a price much under that at present maintained in the retail stores. What he has done can he doue on hundreds of acres of land near his that is just as fertile.

This year a large portion of Mr. Kraak's berry crop went to waste while Sait Lake enjoyed a fruit famine because the price paid by the Sait Lake retailers who raised the price to consumers to a prohibitive point, did not make it worth while to have them picked. Biackberries, raspberries and dewberries were wasted in large quantities, while peaches and apples were not marketed because of a par-tial failure of the crop. Pears, how-ever are abundant in many orchards south of Sait Lake, but are not being hrought to this market, while retail-ers are charging 5 cents each for them.
