

MOBBED THE ZIONISTS. Gross Outrage Committed by Intol-

erant Chicagoans.

Columbus, O., July 31.-Last night a moh stormed the residence in Mans-field, O. where four Zionist elders were holding services, and captured the eld-ers. Two of the men. A. McFarlane of Marion, and G. F. Stevens, of Chi-cago, promised to leave the city, and were released. The others, E. P. Fisher and A. W. McClurkin, of Chicago, refused to make such a promise, and the mob. after stripping them of their clothes, painted their bodies with ultraparine blue and paraded them through the streets.

Today John Alexander Dowle, head of the Zionists, telegraphed Gov. Nash from Montague, Mich., asking protec-tion for the elders at Mansfield. The governor communicated with the sherif of Richland county, who replied that the elders left town at noon, and that everything was quiet. Nash wired Dowie that when

he Mansfield authorities notified him they were unable to preserve the peace it would be time for him to act.




