DANIEL VERY MUCH OPPOSED.

Peace Treaty Takes Up Five Hours' Time in the Senate.

MONEY CERTAIN TREATY.

Senator Wolcott of Colorado Says That He Will Today Speak on Expansion.

Washington, Feb. 3.—For more than five hours today the Senate listened to arguments in opposition to expansion in support of the ratification of the treaty of peace. The speakers were Mr. Money of Mississippi and Mr. Daniel of Virginia. The former's address was comparatively brief. Mr. Daniel made an elaborate speech, in which he covered all the points in controversy. His speech was a brilliant historical effort.

Mr. Wolcott of Colorado gave notice at the opening of the session that he would address the Senate tomorrow on the subject of expansion. Mr. Hale (Maine) presented the conference report on the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill and it was agreed to pass it.

The President pro tempore presented a memorial from the chamber of commerce of New York, asking the ratification of the peace treaty. Mr. Hale, chairman of the naval affairs committee, favorably reported the following resolution, and it was agreed to pass it:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to have erected in the harbor of New York, a suitable, durable monument to the memory of the sailors and marines who have fallen by the explosion of the United States steamer Maine in the harbor of Havana on the 15th day of February, 1898, and who were killed in that country, and in suitable inscriptions and suitable monuments and the sum of \$25,000 is appropriated for this purpose.

Mr. Money declared that if they were not fitted to be citizens of the United States, and the result of the vote to have them to their own country, they might work out their own destiny. Mr. Money extended a commendation of the situation in the Philippines. He told how Americans had been sent to the Philippines to take the place of the Spaniards, and how they had been treated. He said that the United States had a duty to do in the Philippines, and that it was not to be a mere protectorate, but a true government.
