Question of Religious Instruction Made Prominent.

FARIBAULT SYSTEM PLANS.

Federal Party Says Use of School Bouses for Religious Purposes is Contrary to U. S. Constitution.

Manila, July 12.-The first public discursion of the bill to establish a department of public instruction developed a contest on the question of religin public schools. Interest centers in the section permitting priests and ministers to teach religion for half an hour three times weekly outside of school hours, provided the parents express a written desire for such instruction, and prohibiting teachers from conducting religious exercises or the teaching of religion. The directors of the Federal party were represented by a committee who, although Catholics, argued strongly in favor of the elimination of the section. They declared that the use of the school houses for religious purposes is contrary to the United States Constitution, and also to the latforms of the American parties and the Philippine Federal party, and is cer-

ain to cause discord. Judge Taft said the attitude of the U. S. Philippine commission as a legis-lative power was one of absolute indifference between Catholic, Protestant or Mohammedan religions. The commissioners, he added, endeavored to rame the act so that the people's prejutices would assist instead of retard its

New York, Jan. 11 .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say: "Only in textiles is special hesitation shown. Staple products are firm, iron and steel prices are held without trouble, boots and shoes and wool are stetady, and all with fair demand, so that manufacturers are busy. In textiles, however, the improvement which seemed to be promised with the new year is still delayed, and in cotion goods stocks are growing in some quarters, though still not oppressively heavy anywhere. Throughout the country distribution of merchandise continues on a good scale and collections are

unusually prominent. 'Construction of bridges and buildings, together with contemplated track elevations, crowds the capacity of the concerns, making structural shapes of iron and steel. Orders for locomotives cars, rails, and all forms of railway equipments are also abundant, and there is no sign of reaction in the indus-try. Plate and sheet mills have large nbusiness and merchant steel is in prisk demand. Competition is keen, however, and increased operations fail to affect prices. New schedules are promised in the near future and lower freight rates are anticipated, stocks decreased slightly in December, but there is fear of accumulation, and quotations at Pitisburg and Philadelphia have de-

clined during the past week, "Investment of Wall street capital was rumored as supporting cotton and wheat, but the effect was not permanent. L. D. S. Business College Opens Monday in New Apartments.

IT IS A GREAT CHANGE.

Social Hall and Lion House Continue in Use-Night School in New Quarters-Other Meetings.

The Latter-day Saints' business college was transferred today to the new home, east of the Temple, on Main street, and now occupies every room of the new building. On Monday the business college will therefore open in these roomy, new apartments, and will hereafter be conducted entirely therein.

The change in location from the old Social hall to the new temple of learning, is like a sudden transformation; for the old quarters were very ordinary, while the new ones are extraordinary. No other business college in this western country occupies an entire building, or is fitted out with such equipments, rooms, and facilities as this institution. It is learned, however, that the Social hall is not abandoned by the college, but is now to be used as a gymnasium for the students of both sixes. Mrs. Freda B. Cluff, instructor in physical culture is proceeding to organize regular classes in physical train-ing, each section of which will meet two afternoons every week for general athletic exercises on the upper floor of

It is learned also that the high school and normal departments will continue to occupy the Lion house, as it would not be possible to put the 500 students of all departments into any one of the three hubbles now coupled. The colthree buildings now occupied. The cofege will thus occupy, for the rest of the present school year, the new busi-ness college building, the Lion house and the Social hall. The large three-story, brick granary located near the new college building, is also partly used by the college as a boiler house, and for tollet rooms. This building will be en-tirely vacated next summer as the presiding lishop's store room, and will then be fitted up into chemical and bi-ological laboratories by the college

The college night school, which has hitherto been very inadequately pro-vided for in certain rooms of the Lion house, will be opened Monday night in the new building, and will be charac-terized by four improvements:—it will be well-lighted well-warmed and ven-tilated, and will have every convenience of thorough equipment and plen-ty of room. Ten teachers have been given classes in the night school.

It is likely that the college assembly room will be used for various public meetings, for which the Assembly hall is a little too large, and any of the ward houses too small or too far from the center. Correspondent on Vaccination vs Boards of Health and Education.

Morgan City, Jan. 10.-This question of vaccination I have followed very closely for about one year and a half, and have to call the attention of the public including the board of health and the medical fraternity, to a phase of the question I have not yet seen

The compulsory vaccination that the board of health advocates deprives the dren of their liberty to elect for them-selves whether their children shall be accinated or not. We have no lay n our statutes that makes it compulsory, neither is there any law of gress that compels such a proceedure. Under the school law all children are eligible to the benefits of education at all times unless suffering from some contagious disease, and to exclude those that are not is an infraction of the law, and the board of trustees so

of ore the law.

If the edict of the board of health is tenable, should they not also require all children under school age to be vaccinated also all over and the unvaccinated parents? I take the position that it would be far better if the board of health should demand the thorough cleaning up of all the effete and de-caying matter that accumulates around restaurants, saloons and kindred places in Salt Lake City, and if doctors would use the simple remedy that has been published many times I mean 1 gr. sugar lead, 1 gr. fox glove (digatilis) to tea spoonful of sugar dis-solved in 1 tea spoonful of water, to which should be added 4 ounces of water. I teaspoonful to be administered every hour the contagion would soon

be stamped out.

This remedy has been used in hospitals where there have been from 50 to 100 cases - a time with perfect success, but I suppose there is not money enough for the doctor in such cases. DANGER OF VACCINATION.
